SECTION I

The parcel of land depicted on the Town of Liberty tax map as parcel 35.-1-6.6 is comprised of approximately 8.28 acres and is situated within two zoning districts of the Town of Liberty upon the Town of Liberty Zoning Map. The southerly portion is located in the SC Service Commercial District. The northerly portion is located in the RD Rural Development District. The Town Board finds that tax map parcel 35.-1-6.6 in its entirety should be within the SC Service Commercial District in order that it may be uniformly used and developed consistent with the Town of Liberty Zoning Law and Comprehensive Plan.

SECTION II

The zoning map of the Town of Liberty is hereby amended so that the portion of the parcel of land depicted on the Town of Liberty tax map as parcel 35.-1-6.6 that is situate within the RD Rural Development District is removed from such district and added to the adjoining SC Service Commercial District such that the entirety of tax map parcel 35.-1-6.6 shall be located in the SC Service Commercial District.

SECTION III

If any clause, sentence, phrase, paragraph or any part of this local law shall for any reason be adjusted finally by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not effect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this local law, but shall be confined in its operation and effect to the clause, sentence, phrase, paragraph or any part thereof, directly involved in the controversy or action in which such judgment shall have been rendered. It is hereby stated to be the legislative intent that the remainder of this local law would have been adopted had any such provisions not been included.

SECTION IV

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the office of the Secretary of State.


Good speaking to you earlier today regarding the above-noted matter. I have attached a copy of my August 21, 2020 letter to the town planning board along with two (2) copies of the "Conceptual Site Plan" I prepared, dated August 18, 2020. We had a Zoom video discussion with that board at their September 1, 2020 meeting.

Basically, Michael Taylor of CES would like to purchase a 2 acre vacant parcel lying between Old Route 17 (C.R. 176) and Main Street, just easterly of the Hamlet of Parksville, located in the SC - "Service Commercial" zone, for installing a future maximum of six (6) - 30,000 gallon aboveground propane tanks, along with a small office/shop building.

The SC zone does not specifically allow this use although it does permit "industrial enterprises" as a Special Use. The planning board appeared to be generally in favor of this proposal at this site, but reluctant to grant approvals that would set a precedent for similar uses in other SC zones elsewhere in the town. Their attorney, Jacob Billig, suggested an "Overlay" allowance for only the Parksville SC zone to permit the tanks, which is obviously subject to town board approval. Jacob suggested we have a discussion with you and your board members, which is the intent of this letter and attachments.

Your board's comments/suggestions would be appreciated. If our attendance at a future board meeting would be helpful, both Mike Taylor and myself would be available.




Thank you for applying for the Sullivan Renaissance 2020 Golden Feather Community Impact Grant. The Grant Review Committee (“Committee”) thoroughly reviewed the Town’s application. However, they did not vote to award the Town the Golden Feather Community Impact Grant at this time. The Committee agreed that development of Walnut Mountain Park is a worthwhile; however, wanted to see progress on the construction of the pavilion using the 2018 Golden Feather grant before awarding further funds for the project. Overall, the project was well received by the Committee but the ultimate consensus was to recommend splitting the project in phases with the construction of the pavilion being phase I.

Specifically with regard to the exercise equipment, the Town might consider contacting CCE Sullivan County or other municipalities that have installed similar equipment to determine a more realistic price range.

Sullivan Renaissance is available to assist the Town in your efforts to continue moving the Walnut Mountain project forward. 

WATER & SEWER

Water/Sewer Foreman Stacey Yaun appeared and went over his report with the Board.

1. NY Rural water finished mapping of Stevensville Water District. We now have all maps of this district and we can add to this mapping any time we need to.

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2. Boring of lake is not a success. We are looking at going between the two bridges by the spillway of the lake. This will probably not be done until spring. This will be over the top like the pipe is in Ferndale.
3. W.S.S. phase 9 is winding down and the change order for the Well #1 has been started with the pipe run to the well from the pump station building. We still have \$14,000 to spend from the grant. I would like to put that money into the driveway with 2 culverts and raise driveway because of heavy rain the driveway floods. This would be an improvement.
4. Stevensville water job - The well field is all re-piped. The first bore between the little pond and the lake has been all connected. It was a long day for shut down and refill of the pipe. We are waiting for Tam with telemetry, generator work, and Layne to redo the pump and motor.
5. The tank is coming along very well. They should be done in about 2 weeks.
6. We had a problem with Stevensville water with the pump not coming on auto. We went out that evening. We were getting signal from the tank but not coming on. We came to the conclusion that there was something wrong in the panel, so we ended up running it on hand for the night, going back at midnight to check and back in at 3am to shut it off. I called Ross electric in the morning about another problem with the Infirmary generator and realize he had a man that does Fallsburg water stuff and asked him if he could have his guy come over as per what I said, it was in the panel and the delay on switch was bad. The best part of all this is that I found someone to work on our old antiquated stuff. Something going right for a change.
7. As per the pictures I sent you about Swan Lake sewer and the problem in ditch #1, we came up with a solution and are testing it now to hope that it holds. This is only the beginning because the whole end of that pipe blew out.
8. I have a big concern about going into the winter with two tanks in Stevensville. My concern is the ice pack on old tank and if we are going to have enough movement in the tank with the two tanks online. The solution to this is to put a mixer in the tank that will keep the ice pack at bay. I have looked at my budget and getting a mixer for this tank is not a problem. We may also divide it between Ferndale, Rt. 55 & Loomis because they feed off of this tank. Will bring prices to meeting and be looking for approval to do this. This is very important that we get this done.

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9. The DOH has notified me that there will be another sampling requirement for PFOA, PFA's and dioxane. As far as I can understand this will be a quarterly testing that will cost of 2500.-3000 a year. This cost will have to be added to my sampling budget. I believe it is a raw water sample from each well system, so you would have WSS well #1 when on line, well #2 which is online, meaning that WSS will pay 5000-6000 in extra sampling. Stevensville water district will consist of Sherwood well, Roth well, Well #4, and Well #3. Lately with a raw water being that Sherwood and Roth are so close, we only have to take from one of them, but I will not know that until the DOH advises me on that. So if that is not the case, this would cost 10000-13000 a year for this testing. Again this could be split between the districts that are supplied by Stevensville. Just another hurdle we have to push through.
10. I have been going through applications and will be starting to interview people in the next couple of weeks.
11. Apparently, some places are questioning our sewer meters which has entailed CPE services to come and check out these couple of meters. The problems are self-inflicted. This is why I or we at the sewer dept have these sewer meters calibrated in the Spring and we pay for this service because we know that the places that have these meters will not have it done. So this is a good thing that happened because they do not have a leg to stand on that the meters are out of calibration.

3. The Next CDBG Grant Project Phase 10(?)– White Sulphur Springs Boyd Road and Well #1

- So, for the next application, since Well 1 work gets done under Phase 9, Boyd Road replacement would be the lead item.
- Date for next funding application round is not yet defined- not likely to happen in 2020
- Town agreed at the April 15, 2020 meeting to move forward to revise and resubmit in 2020 for a CFA OCR CDBG grant for the work requested in 2019 application and providing a new pump and pitless – focus on providing a redundant pump and associated work for White Sulphur District as the first priority and the Boyd Road watermain as secondary
- Public hearing to announce the Town's intent to apply was held today (May 18, 2020) at 6:45PM
- Town to do research to identify residential property transfers from July 1, 2015 through the present. For this search vacant land, commercial properties, institutional properties, churches, Town property, County property and State property don't count. Trying to determine which occupied residential properties changed hands
- Exit interview teleconference was held on June 8 with NYSCOR's Charlie Phillion, Town Supervisor, Mark Blauer and Delaware to discuss ways to improve the application

 - Delaware prepared the Engineering Report – at no cost to the Town - with the project scope and cost and submitted to Mark Blauer on July 18, 2019
 - OCR CDBG Grant application package submitted by Mark Blauer on July 22, 2019
 - Estimated project cost - \$747,350 – versus \$750,000 grant limit
 - Planned work in 2019 included:
 - Boyd Road:
 - Furnishing and installation of 600 LF of new 6" watermain (DR 9 HDPE), fittings, and appurtenances under NYS Rt. 52 and Boyd Road by directional drilling
 - Furnishing and installation of 900 LF of new 6" water main (Class 52 DIP), fittings, and appurtenances under Boyd Road by open cut.
 - Furnishing and installation of up to six (6) new mainline/isolation water valve assemblies for future isolation to facilitate maintenance and line flushing.
 - Furnishing and installation of up to four (4) new hydrant assemblies and appurtenances.
 - Furnishing and installation of six (6) new 1" copper water services by open cut.
 - Site Restoration
 - Well 1 Redevelopment:
 - Performance of well redevelopment, testing, and disinfection

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- Installation of a new pitless adapter unit (provided by the Town using Phase 8 funds) to the existing well casing
- Installation of a new submersible well pump (provided by the Town using Phase 8 funds) within the existing well casing
- Furnishing and installation of a new well VFD and electrical appurtenances
- Integration of new well power and controls into the existing well house electrical and control systems.
- Furnishing and installation of up to 250 LF of new 4" water main (Class 52 DIP), fittings, and appurtenances to connect the redeveloped Well #1 to the existing White Sulphur Springs Well House
- Site restoration
- NOTE: OCR stated in December 2019 that remaining Phase 8 funds could not be used to buy the pitless or pump

4. Stevensville Radio Work

- The radio system will take the place of the landline that currently conveys the tank level reading at Water Tower Road tank to the controls for the Sherwood and Roth pumps, and Stevensville pumps. The scope of work provided by General Controls includes providing the necessary radio telemetry and appurtenances at the Water Tower Road tank, the Sherwood/Booster pump building on Shore Road and at the Stevensville wellfield control building.
- Town awarded work on August 19, 2019 to the sole responder, General Controls, for a cost of \$21,800 for the radio system, plus an optional cost of \$1,000 additional for a new pressure transducer at Water Tower road, if needed.
- General Controls has installed all equipment (including the radio they were waiting for since May) and will come on site to disconnect phone lines and calibrate the systems and get the system running on radios when Stacey agrees to it.
- Seasonal flows have subsided, General Controls was onsite last week. Plan to finish up in the next two to three weeks.

6. Swan Lake WWTP

- At the September 16, 2020 meeting, the Town Board resolved to extend to the public hearing comment period through the September 21 meeting/workshop.
- In the September 21, 2020 NYSEFC Letter of Submittal of Hardship Materials Extension, attached, **NYSEFC has granted the Town with an extension to extend the CWSRF application deadline to continue to qualify for hardship financing,**

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- **The NYSEFC has reviewed the Town of Liberty's recent request and supporting documentation** to extend the CWSRF Finance application deadline to continue to qualify for hardship financing.
- Based on the project schedule, measures necessary to increase the SPDES permitted flow capacity at the plant, and the continuing challenges presented by COVID-19, **EFC is granting an extension to submit an acceptable CWSRF financing application to no later than May 31, 2021.**
- **However, for this project to continue to qualify for hardship financing, the Town must execute a Project Finance Agreement with EFC by December 2, 2021**, the deadline in the January 10, 2019 hardship eligibility letter.

A community wastewater collection/treatment system will remove this barrier and enable investors to concentrate their resources on business development.





Ms. Osterhoudt,

I am writing this letter to request a time extension regarding the aforementioned project. Understanding the project completion date is October 29th, Layne is requesting an extension of 5 weeks to complete our portion of the work. The anticipated ship date of the 11RAHC pump setting is currently November 6th. The delay is due to an extensive back and forth with the manufacturer to ensure the pump setting that is shipped, is exactly what is needed by the Town of Liberty.

This pump setting was originally quoted to us in March 2020. After project award, our submittals were approved on July 6th with the understanding that the *“Contractor is responsible for dimensions to be confirmed and correlated at the job site.”* We then followed up on our order on July 13th and requested a few technical changes including; dimension of discharge head base and an adjustable screw-in top special pipe. Unfortunately, we had to work with a new sales representative who did not fully understand the order and additional explanation was needed. We received a revised spec on July 20th but the new sales rep changed more than requested. We requested another revised quote and received a response on July 27th. Our official order was placed on August 4th and answered a few miscellaneous questions that were asked. After discussions, we received a final order confirmation on August 11th and we gave approval to move into production on August 12th. The next day we received additional questions/and objections from their engineering due to utilizing a threaded top special pipe for discharge adjustment (which we have used in the past with no issues). For the next two weeks we dealt with the engineering departments questions and finally came to an agreement. The order was again finalized on August 24th and it took the manufacturer until September 1st to resend the final confirmation and move into production.

The standard lead time for a setting like this is 11-13 weeks and due to change in personnel at our manufacturer we lost an understanding on a few specific details. This snowballed into a long, unanticipated and unwanted delay on our order. I apologize for the inconvenience caused. I hope that time lost in ordering, will be worth a smooth installation in the near future. Please let me know if you need any additional information. We will be pushing for an expedited delivery if at all possible. Thank you for your understanding.



The tank will be completed and I believe the project may be deemed substantially complete by the original contract date, however we will still have a few weeks of site work at the tank site to be completed. At this time we are requesting to extend the contract to November 30, 2020 to allow for all of the contract items to be completed.
