### Overview

The Parks Department remains in full swing as we continue to keep up with mowing and maintaining our fields, including lining for both Warriors and AYSO soccer. The pool is now closed for the season, and we are working on storing and securing equipment for the winter months. At the same time, we are focusing on capital improvement planning for future projects while beginning preparations for the upcoming fall and winter seasons.

Recreation programs had a strong summer as both Day Camp and Swim Lessons came to a successful conclusion. Planning is underway for our annual Fall Festival, which will include a new addition this year, a 5K race in partnership with Liberty School. Warriors Football and Cheerleading are also in full swing as their season progresses. Looking ahead, we have begun planning the Halloween Parade.

In the office, we are actively developing workflow charts and preparing for the rollout of Open.gov to make our forms and processes more accessible to the community. We are also working on the Swim Grant and researching additional grant opportunities to support future initiatives.

2026 Budget is in process. We have increased our budget due to increased costs. We are reviewing our capital improvement plan to include paving at Walnut Mountain a dog park, new truck fleet. We are looking into grant monies to help offset our costs and offer more to our community.

- B) Park Supervisor's Report The majority of the park attendants have returned to school. We are preparing for the Fall Festival, removing branches and clearing paths. We will be doing maintenance on the park restrooms over the winter With the continual mowing there has not been much time for improvements to the park. A discussion was held regarding clean up fees and closing times on park forms.
- C) Recreation Supervisor's Report We unfortunately had to cancel the Junior Warriors football team due to lack of numbers at practices. The senior team has won their first game. Indoor pickle permit has been sent to the school for approval. We are also preparing for the Halloween Parade. We are still looking for food vendors for the Fall Festival.

# PLANNING SERVICES AGREEMENT between Genius Loci Planning and the Town of Liberty, New York

This agreement is between the Genius Loci Planning, 1796 County Hwy 6, Bovina Center, NY, (hereinafter referred to as the "GLP") and the Town of Liberty, 120 North Main St. Liberty, NY 12754 (hereinafter referred to as the "Town").

WHEREAS, the Town desires to engage GLP to perform certain professional and technical services;

WHEREAS, Peter Manning, Principal, GLP is qualified, and has agreed to perform such services:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions and agreements contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the parties do hereby agree as follows:

# 1. SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED

The Town agrees to engage GLP and GLP agrees to provide professional planning assistance as set forth in Appendices 1 and 2, attached hereto.

# TOWN RESPONSIBILITIES

The town will be responsible for:

- Establishing a Comprehensive Plan Committee
- Convening and posting project meetings in compliance with Open Meetings Law
- · Printing or printing costs directly affiliated with the project
- Working with GLP to assist as needed the coordination of mapping services with Sullivan County
- Working with GLP to assist as needed the coordination of the required county referral process with Sullivan County

# 2. PERIOD OF SERVICES

The period of services for this agreement begins <u>October 19, 2025</u> (or on date of supervisor's signature) and continues until <u>October 19, 2027</u>, unless otherwise amended by mutual written agreement between GLP and the Town.

# 3. COSTS/PAYMENT SCHEDULE

GLP will charge \$67.50 per hour for work performed under this contract in an amount not to exceed \$43.350 and to include travel time to and from meetings as required to fulfill the obligations of this contract. There are no charges for mileage. GLP will submit monthly or bimonthly invoices to the Town, with payments to be issued within 30 days of receipt of invoice.

GLP agrees to execute the work diligently according to the terms of this contract.

This contract and any appendices attached hereto are the entire agreement of the parties and supersede any agreement, oral or written, pertaining hereto. This contract may be amended in writing signed by both parties. This contract may be terminated for convenience by either party by notification in writing to the other party. The Town shall, upon such termination, be responsible for payment for services rendered up to the time of such notification.

# 4. NO ASSIGNMENT

In accordance with the provisions of General Municipal Law §109, GLP is hereby prohibited from assigning, transferring, conveying, subletting or otherwise disposing of this Agreement, or of its right, title and interest in this Agreement, or its power to execute this Agreement, to any other person or entity without the prior written consent of the Town.

## 5. INCORPORATION OF LEGALLY REQUIRED PROVISIONS

Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed to have been inserted herein. If any provision is not inserted through mistake or otherwise, then upon application of either party, this Agreement shall be physically amended forthwith to make such insertion.

# 6. MODIFICATION AND WAIVER

No modification or waiver of any of the terms of this Agreement, including this provision, shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the party sought to be charged. No waiver of any breach or default hereunder shall be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach or default of the same or similar nature.

# 7. INVALIDITY AND SURVIVAL

If any of the provisions of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable, all other provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect.

# 8. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement sets forth all of the promises, representations, warranties, covenants, agreements, conditions and understandings relative to the transaction set forth herein, and neither the Town nor the Contractor are reliant upon any promises, representations, agreements, conditions, covenants or understandings, either oral or written, other than those expressly set forth herein.

#### Provide an overview of the project including goals, tasks, desired outcomes and performance measures:

The Town and Village of Liberty is located within Sullivan County approximately 100 miles Northwest of NYC. The project focus is to hire professional planning services for shared review and update the joint comprehensive plan. The current plan is 17 years old and in need of review. Liberty's town and village have shown modest growth since the pandemic. This population increase is reflected in the schools as well. Liberty Central is one of a few districts in Mid-Hudson to show an increase in student population. The face of the community is changing. The latest census data indicates the Hispanic population has grown significantly with the village's Hispanic population nearing 44%. The Orthodox Jewish Population has increased as well, and this community has submitted plans for new schools and housing developments. Moreover the average resident age is hovering at 33 years old. To meet the needs of a growing diverse population it's vital that the town, village, and public re-examine the comp plan. This review will help both governments set policy, target better sources of funding for community needs, and enhance quality of life for all Liberty residents.

The town and village joint comprehensive plan is 17 years old. Given the population growth, significant changes to demographics, and increased development in the area, updating the comp plan is imperative to meet the needs of this changing community. Additionally, this updated plan will provide a valuable tool for the town, village, and residents to plan for smart development and future progress. The current estimate for this update is \$43,350. Funding through the Local Government Efficiency program will greatly reduce the financial burden on both municipalities, show the public our commitment and financial responsibility, and ensure this plan is followed through to completion.

#### INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT

THIS INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), dated \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2025 (the "Effective Date") is entered into by and between the LIBERTY CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT, by and through the Board of Education thereof, with offices at 115 Buckley Street, Liberty, NY 12754 (the "District") and the TOWN OF LIBERTY by and through the Town Board, with offices at 120 North Main Street, Liberty, NY 12754 (the "Town") (hereinafter individually "Party", and together "Parties").

WHEREAS, the Parties are municipal corporations authorized to enter into intermunicipal agreements pursuant to Article 5-G of the New York State General Municipal Law to carry out any function or responsibility each has the authority to undertake alone; and

WHEREAS, the Town wishes to support and assist the District to respond to certain emergencies and disasters, as may arise; and

WHEREAS, the District wishes to support and assist the Town to respond to certain emergencies and disasters, as may arise; and

WHEREAS, the District finds it appropriate and cost-effective to provide the Town access to the District's equipment, buildings and grounds to provide services in the event of certain emergencies or disasters; and

WHEREAS, the Town finds it appropriate and cost-effective to provide the District access to the Town's equipment, buildings and grounds to provide services in the event of certain emergencies or disasters; and

WHEREAS, the District and Town mutually desire and are authorized to enter into an agreement to allow the Parties to access the Parties' equipment, buildings and grounds, as needed, to provide Emergency Services (as defined herein) in order for the Parties to respond to certain emergencies and disasters; and

WHEREAS, an emergency or disaster shall mean an event or occurrence which impairs the Parties' abilities to safely operate or endangers the health, safety and welfare of the Parties' employees, staff, visitors, residents and students, as applicable; and

WHEREAS, "Emergency Services" shall be defined as services to be provided by the Town to the District, and by the District to the Town, including necessary supplies and equipment, as a result of an emergency or disaster which prevents or impairs the Parties' abilities to safely operate or are otherwise needed to ensure the health, safety and welfare of the Parties' employees, staff, visitors, residents and students, as applicable; and

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of the promises and covenants hereinafter set forth, it is AGREED by and between the Parties as follows:

- 1. Emergency Services. The Parties agree that, upon electronic, telephone, or in-person communication from the District to the Town, or from the Town to the District, the responding Party shall be permitted access to the requesting Party's equipment, buildings and grounds to provide Emergency Services as requested. The Parties agree that they shall exercise reasonable care in conducting their respective activities in furtherance of providing Emergency Services. Notwithstanding the foregoing, each Party, in its sole discretion, may request Emergency Services from a third-party as needed, either as an alternative to or in addition to Emergency Services from one another.
- Costs of Material and Services. Each Party shall bear their respective costs related to labor and equipment used in furtherance of providing Emergency Services. The cost of any materials used in further of providing Emergency Services shall be borne by the Party requesting such Emergency Services.
- 3. Indemnification. Each Party agrees to defend, indemnify and hold the other Party, its officers, employees, and agents, harmless, at all times during and after the term of this Agreement, from and against all claims, damage, losses, and expenses (including without limitations, reasonable attorneys' fees) arising from, or in any way connected with the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of, or a breach of any term or condition contained in this Agreement by the indemnifying Party, its employees, agents or representatives.
- 4. Term. This Agreement shall commence on or about the Effective Date and continue for a period of one (1) year. Thereafter, this Agreement shall automatically renew for additional one (1) year terms unless otherwise terminated as provided herein. Either party may terminate this agreement upon thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party.
- Compliance with Law. The Parties agree that they shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and all other applicable resolutions, ordinances, codes, rules, and regulations.
- 6. Choice of Law and Venue. This Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of New York and any legal action filed concerning the enforcement or interpretation of this Agreement shall be brought in the state or federal courts, as applicable, located in Sullivan County, New York.
- 7. Entire Agreement. This Agreement is subject to the approval of the governing bodies of the Parties. The foregoing constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties and supersedes any and all prior proposals, negotiations, and agreements, whether written or oral. Any modification or amendment to this Agreement shall be void unless it is in writing and signed by both parties.
- 8. Multiple Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, all of which when so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same agreement.

Services. Company will solicit Municipality residents and businesses to participate in Community Solar Program(s) ("Program"). During the Term of this Agreement, Municipality shall grant to Solar Simplified an exclusive license to use any necessary branding (including but not limited to names, logos, and letterhead) and any other intellectual property necessary for Solar Simplified to perform the Services, including, specifically, for marketing purposes. This license will terminate upon the termination or expiration of this Agreement. The Parties shall seek to issue, where appropriate, joint press release statements or other such public announcements concerning Solar Projects. During the Term of this Agreement, Company shall be the exclusive marketing agent retained by the Municipality in connection with marketing community solar services and products.

Payment. Company shall pay Municipality a one-time acquisition fee of \$50 per enrolled community solar Customer. Payment shall be made on the month following receipt of payment for Customer(s)' first community solar credits invoice. Termination of the Agreement for any reason does not absolve Company from making payments (if any are due) for Services provided in accordance with this Agreement. Upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, Customers for which Municipality received payment shall remain those of Company, and Municipality or any agent of the Municipality agrees not to solicit these Customers for other community solar Projects in the future without Company's consent.

#### TABLED- LOOMIS SEWER CLARIFIER

#### Discussion - Loomis Sewer Clarifier

#### · Overview:

The Board discussed whether to **repair or replace** the Loomis sewer clarifier, which is currently out of operation. While this does not yet violate the SPDES permit, the system must be addressed to remain compliant.

#### Cost Estimates & Options:

- Repair estimate: \$62,000 (including \$48,000 for work and an additional \$14,000 in related costs).
- Replacement estimate: \$97,000 for equipment only (installation and additional work would increase total cost, potentially to \$150,000+).
- Board noted that repair costs may increase once the clarifier is fully disassembled and additional damage is assessed.
- Concern raised about investing heavily in a 12-year-old system that was not properly installed initially.

#### Liability and Recourse:

- The original installation (11 years ago) was done by Kelly Engineering, whose engineer has since passed away.
- No legal recourse is expected due to the age of the installation.

#### Financial Considerations:

- Replacement would deplete the sewer district's capital fund, leaving no reserves for future needs.
- Repair might be a more feasible short-term solution, but funding options and future reliability remain concerns.

 Capital planning and maintaining adequate reserves were stressed as essential to avoid emergency funding needs or significant tax increases.

#### Next Steps:

- Obtain bid specifications for both repair and replacement options.
- Consider issuing an RFP for engineering services rather than automatically using Delaware Engineering.
- Gather more information on the condition of the remaining operational clarifier and any existing maintenance schedules.
- Explore capital funding strategies and plan for long-term infrastructure needs.
- Discussion included the need to resolve the \$14,000 already incurred before new bids proceed.

#### DISCUSSION

Land Clearing Local Law.

#### Local Law Requirements & Confusion

- The current draft of the local law is somewhat unclear and incomplete.
- It appears to prohibit cutting more than a quarter acre without a clear-cutting permit.
- Projects over one acre may need to go before the Planning Board.
- Board members referenced another town's ("Forestburgh's law") as a comprehensive example.

#### 2. State Oversight - DEC Rules

- The New York State DEC takes jurisdiction over land disturbance over one acre, which triggers SWPPP (Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan) requirements.
- The board agrees the town should require proof of DEC approval as part of the permit/workflow process.

 The goal is to close the compliance loop — if a property owner says they won't clear land and then does so, they must face consequences and acknowledge DEC oversight.

#### 3. Balancing Local Permits & Enforcement

- Concern was raised that requiring permits for every quarter-acre clearing would overwhelm the permitting process.
- Instead, the focus should be on enforcing existing DEC requirements for larger projects and integrating that into town workflows.
- DEC enforcement is usually effective, and violators face significant fines.

#### **PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

#### Clear-Cutting at Shore Road Cemetery Site

- Cora reported extensive clear-cutting on a property known as 420 Shore Road, adjacent to a cemetery and on a steep, terraced slope.
- The clearing exceeded one acre and was done without a Stormwater Pollution
   Prevention Plan (SWPPP) a state-mandated requirement for such projects.
- There was no permit box on-site, and the DEC confirmed no SWPPP permit existed.

 Mrs. Edwards argued this shows a failure in enforcement, especially if the planning board granted conditional project approval but did not verify that those conditions were met before work began.

#### 2. Environmental Risks and Damage Potential

- The lack of compliance is particularly concerning because the site is close to a lake, raising risks of erosion, runoff, and water pollution.
- The speaker noted that significant environmental damage can occur on less than one acre, so the potential impact of this much larger clear-cut is substantial.

#### 3. Planning Board Process Issues

- Mrs. Edwards criticized the planning board's handling of a separate violation involving a property near Horseshoe Lake:
  - There was a lengthy debate about requiring a \$2,500 escrow account for engineering work related to violations.
  - After confusion and procedural errors, the board's vote was declared null and void because alternates failed to declare they were voting in place of absent members.
- She called this "embarrassing and dangerous", citing it as evidence of procedural weaknesses.

#### 4. Qualifications and Certification Concerns

- Cora questioned how many planning board members are certified and have current training credits required to make legally sound decisions.
- If board members are not properly certified:
  - Their votes may be invalid or legally vulnerable.
  - They may lack the qualifications to act as lead agency on projects under SEQRA (State Environmental Quality Review Act).

 With a building boom underway in Sullivan County and Liberty, the speaker recommended that the town ensure planning board members are fully certified and possibly require a minimum certification standard to serve.

#### **BOARD DISCUSSION**

#### COUNCILMEMBER VINCENT MCPHILLIPS

#### 1. Project Overview

- A developer associated with Green Hills (described as cooperative and professional) has purchased additional property on Devaney Road near Vance's house, extending to the transmission line.
- The plan is to build approximately 200+ new homes on the site.
- The developer intends to be self-sufficient in utilities, specifically:
  - Private wells for water supply.
  - o A privately operated sewer treatment plant.

#### 2. Power Supply Assessment

- The developer asked about the availability of sufficient electrical capacity to support the proposed development.
- Councilmember Vincent McPhillips personally inspected the local electrical infrastructure and reported:
  - The substation on Ferndale Road has been upgraded.
  - Voltage adjustments, new poles, and capacity improvements have been completed.
  - Voltage currently steps down from 12 kV to 4,800 volts near the project area.
- Conclusion: There is enough power capacity to support the development. The only
  potential obstacle power availability is no longer an issue.

#### 3. Next Steps & Planning Board Role

- The developer has not yet submitted an application to the planning board but plans to do so soon.
- Councilmember McPhillips reminded the board that there was a recent requirement or proposed law that new developments must demonstrate adequate utility capacity an evaluation that should occur during the planning board review.
- The field planners relayed the utility requirement to the developer, prompting the speaker's preliminary assessment.

#### COUNCILMEMBER JOHN LENNON

#### Roadwork & Enforcement Concerns

- Councilmember John Lennon raised a separate issue involving unauthorized road activity:
  - An excavator was seen operating in the middle of a recently resurfaced road near a synagogue/grocery store area, causing potential damage.
  - This occurred without apparent oversight or enforcement action, and Councilmember John Lennon expressed frustration that "nothing ever seems to happen" when violations like this occur.
- They also highlighted the importance of strengthening permit forms and enforcement procedures in the building department, so that future developments are held to new permitting criteria and no details "slip through the cracks."

#### SUPERVISOR FRANK DEMAYO

#### Economic Development Update - PepsiCo Site

- A development group that recently toured a former PepsiCo facility is returning with engineers from Ohio to conduct further site evaluations.
- This is considered a positive sign of potential redevelopment or business investment in the property.
- The Supervisor will continue to provide updates as the situation develops.

#### COUNCILMEMBER DEAN FARRAND

Route 52 Property – Legal Strategy, Cleanup, and Environmental Issues

1. Property Owners Backing Away from Compliance

- The children of the property owners on Route 52 who had previously indicated they
  would address violations are now reversing course and resisting further cleanup
  efforts.
- The town anticipates the situation may escalate to legal action.
- Councilmember Farrand advised that if the matter goes to court, the town should
  pursue complete property remediation not just removal of a single trailer and
  seek to recover any profits the owners made from property sales.

#### 2. Environmental Hazards - Underground Storage Tanks

- Councilmember Farrand emphasized that any legal action should also address potential underground storage tanks on the property, not just visible violations.
- There is a concern that abandoned fuel tanks could still be buried on site, posing environmental risks.
- Councilmember Lennon suggested performing test borings to detect contamination before proceeding further.
- · Councilmember Farrand responded that:
  - Accessing the property without permission is not legally permissible.
  - Under New York State environmental law, any abandoned tanks must either be properly decommissioned (filled with sand) or removed entirely — ignoring them is not an option.
  - Testing for contamination would likely require hiring a specialized contractor.

#### 3. Role of DEC and Legal Responsibility

- Town Attorney Kenneth Klein clarified that if environmental contamination or abandoned tanks are confirmed, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) would take over enforcement and remediation responsibilities.
- Town Attorney Kenneth Klein explained that liability follows the property's chain of title — meaning any prior owners remain legally responsible for contamination, even after the property is sold.

This is also why counties often refuse to assume ownership of contaminated properties
 to avoid becoming part of that liability chain.

#### 4. Next Steps & Strategic Planning

- Councilmember Dean Farrand will circulate the full email chain related to the property for the board to review.
- The board should begin strategizing potential legal action, as it appears the owners will
  not voluntarily complete the required cleanup.
- The situation is **disappointing** to board members, as there was prior agreement and expectation that the owners would "do the right thing" without litigation.

#### COUNCILMEMBER BRUCE DAVIDSON

The town is nearing completion of the initial OpenGov department implementations that were started earlier.

Information gathering has begun for additional departments to start building their own digital forms and workflow systems.

The future rollout is expected to proceed more quickly than earlier phases because the core setup work is already complete.

The goal is to have additional departments onboard and functioning within OpenGov before the end of the year.

Congratulations on the Town's recent success in securing the \$1,000,000 United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) Grant to support the Liberty Business Park Water and Sewer Infrastructure Upgrade Project.

At the February 3, 2025 Town Board Meeting, the Town Board determined through the required RFQ process that Delaware Engineering, D.P.C. is the most highly qualified firm to provide the required A/E services, and that Supervisor, Frank DeMayo is hereby authorized to enter into contract negotiations and execute a Professional Services Agreement.

We appreciate the Town selecting Delaware Engineering to provide engineering services for the Liberty Business Park (Old Route 17 Corridor) Water and Sewer Infrastructure Upgrade Project and for the opportunity to once again assist the Liberty community with this important infrastructure upgrades.

Submitted herewith, for Board consideration, is our agreement to provide professional services for the Liberty Business Park (Old Route 17 Corridor) Water and Sewer Infrastructure Upgrade Project.

This contract outlines our proposed scope of work, and the contract terms associated with the upgrades and is based on the information included in the "March 2023 FY24 General Community Project Request, Award Notification, and September 2, 2025 Work Plan and Budget Narrative", and "August 2024 Town of Liberty - Fast NY Application – Liberty Business Park Application Water and Sewer Improvements Description and Award Notification".

We propose to complete the professional services detailed in this contract for a not-to-exceed-cost of \$1,250,000.

Note that this agreement utilized the \$1 million in federal funding (USEPA STAG CWSRF) by former US Rep. Marc Molinaro via a congressionally directed spending grant and matching funds to move the project to the 50% design phase. Completion of the design phase will take place in a subsequent agreement, with funding provided by the Fast NY Grant.

Please review this agreement and advise us of any desired changes. If all appears acceptable, please sign both of the enclosed copies, retaining the original for Town files, and mail the second signed copy to our Oneonta office for our contracts file.

#### SCOPE AND FEE SUMMARY

We propose to complete the professional services described herein for a not-to-exceed cost of \$1,250,000. The total fee presented below is based on the proposed project plan detailed in the "March 2023 FY24 General Community Project Request and September 2, 2025 Work Plan and Budget Narrative", and "August 2024 Town of Liberty - Fast NY Application – Liberty Business Park Application Water and Sewer Improvements Description".

#### PROJECT BACKGROUND

The Town of Liberty will advance design and engineering for critical water and sewer extensions designed to serve the Old Route 17 Corridor and the Liberty Business Park. These upgrades are essential to create shovel ready sites for up to 1.4 million square feet of commercial and industrial development while ensuring safe, reliable water and sewer service.

The \$1,000,000 congressional appropriation and matching funds of \$250,000 will fund planning and engineering and up to 50% design services. The funding will also help advance the preparation of final plans & specifications required for regulatory approval. A separate \$20 million FAST-NY grant will fund final design and engineering, as well as construction related expenses.

#### ANTICIPATED UPGRADES

The anticipated scope based on the "August 2024 Town of Liberty - Fast NY Application — Liberty Business Park Application Water and Sewer Improvements Description and Award Notification", is summarized below:

#### Water:

Improvements to the Town water system would include replacing approximately 5,700 lineal feet of existing 6-inch diameter watermain from the intersection of Ferndale Road/Sullivan Avenue and Old Route 17/Harris Road, up Old Route 17 to the southern end of the existing Town Water District (WD022) with new 12-inch diameter piping and appurtenances, and installing approximately 800 lineal feet of new 12-inch diameter watermain and appurtenances (note: diameter needed to be increased based on higher demands), terminating near the midpoint of Business Park #1.

Approximately 2,350 lineal feet of the existing 8-inch diameter main and appurtenances connected to the Village's water system from the Exit 100 roundabout, under NY 17/86 and extending onto Triangle Road (on-ramp to NY 17/86 West), should be upgraded to 12-inch diameter pipe. This work would eliminate the 8-inch diameter "bottleneck" between the Town's 12-inch diameter mains.

#### Sanitary Sewer:

In regards to sanitary sewer needs, the Village of Liberty's wastewater treatment plant has adequate capacity to accept sanitary flow (amount subject to a future agreement between the Village and Town) from the development since it is currently operating at about 50% of its permitted flow capacity. However, new and upgraded Town and Village sanitary sewer collection and conveyance infrastructure will be necessary to accommodate this new contribution.

At Business Park #1, new infrastructure will include a new sanitary pump station and emergency generator near the development entrance and a new force main and appurtenances proceeding north to a high point on Old Route 17/Harris Road (approximately 4,000 lineal feet of pipe). The force main will connect to a new gravity sewer line which will run to the intersection of Old Route 17/Harris Road and Sullivan Avenue (approximately 2,000 lineal feet of pipe) and into a second new pump station. The new force main from the second pump station will be installed along Sullivan Avenue (approximately 2,700 lineal feet of pipe) and will connect to the existing Village gravity sewer manhole near the United States Postal Service Building.

The Village's existing Lanning's pump station will continue to operate, picking up flow from NYSDOT and two to three vacant properties.

Alternatively, during design, the depth required to flow by gravity from the Old Route 17/Harris Road and Sullivan Avenue intersection to the existing Village gravity sewer manhole near the United States Postal Service Building can be evaluated and given further consideration.

Other upgrades to the existing Village collection and conveyance system include replacement of the sanitary collection system from existing Village gravity sewer manhole near the United States Postal Service Building to the Days Inn pump station (approximately 1,500 lineal feet of pipe), replacement of the Days Inn pump station and the force main from the Days Inn pump station to the Village WWTP (approximately 2,000 lineal feet of pipe). The magnitude of these improvements can be refined during design.

#### Paving:

It is important to note that utility improvement work will take place within the limits of Sullivan County Department of Public Works and NYSDOT roadways and will, therefore, be subject to the requirements of those agencies. For the purposes of planning and budgeting, costs for repaving of affected roadways have been included. The final facility routes and SCDPW/NYSDOT-acceptable means/methods, including roadway restoration requirements, will need to be refined and addressed during design.

#### Summary of Improvements:

A bulleted summary of proposed water and sewer improvements is as follows:

- Municipal Water:
  - Source Town of Liberty Ferndale Water District (WD022) and Village of Liberty

#### o Facilities Required:

- +/- 2,350 lineal feet of new 12-inch diameter main and appurtenances for Village interconnection from Exit 100 roundabout, under NY 17/86, and continuing to the existing 12-inch interconnect with the Town WD022 system on Triangle Road.
- +/- 5,700 lineal of new 12-inch diameter main and appurtenances from the Ferndale Road/Sullivan Ave intersection with Old Route 17/Harris Road, up Old Route 17, to the end of Town water district WD022.
- +/- 800 lineal feet of new 12-inch (max.) diameter main (i.e., main size is to be refined during design based on demands) and appurtenances from the end of WD022 to the midpoint of Business Park #1 (between Twin Bridge Road and Brooks Road).

#### Municipal Wastewater:

- Treatment Facility Village of Liberty, NY, SPDES NY0030074
- o Facilities Required:
  - Town of Liberty:
    - New sanitary sewer pump station and appurtenances, and +/- 4,000 lineal feet of force main from the northern entrance to Business Park #1 to the high point on Old Route 17/Harris Road.
    - +/- 2,000 lineal feet of new gravity sewer and appurtenances from the high point on Old Route 17/Harris Road to the intersection with Sullivan Avenue.
    - New sanitary pump station and appurtenances at the Old Route 17/Harris Road and Sullivan Avenue.
    - +/- 2,700 lineal feet of new sanitary force main along Sullivan Avenue to the point of connection at the existing Village gravity sewer manhole near the United States Postal Service Building.

#### Village of Liberty:

- Improvements to gravity collection system from Sullivan Avenue to the Days Inn pump station; +/- 1,500 lineal feet.
- Upgrading or replacement of the Days Inn pump station.
- Upgrading or replacement of the force main from the Days Inn pump station to the Village WWTP, +/- 2,000 lineal feet.

A Site Plan with Utility Improvements (Figure 1) and Cost Estimate identifying of all proposed work and estimated costs, is detailed in the "August 2024 Town of Liberty - Fast NY Application – Liberty Business Park Application Water and Sewer Improvements Description".

#### PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

Delaware Engineering is uniquely qualified for this project because our first hand understanding is based on our long-term efforts collaborating with the County, Town and Sullivan Partnership to identify and seek funding for this project. In 2017 we prepared the Old Route 17 Corridor Study/Master Plan which we provided a project scope and cost estimate that accompanied the funding applications. A key step in securing the funding that the project has secured to date.

We refined the scope and budget to secure \$1 million in grant funding from USEPA STAG CWSRF by former US Rep. Marc Molinaro via a congressionally directed spending grant to provide new and upgraded infrastructure to make the area more competitive and diversify the economy.

By further refining the scope and cost, our assistance helped the Town to also secure a \$20 million dollar grant from FAST-NY infrastructure improvement program administered by Empire State Development (ESD), to help the community attract and grow business.

#### **ASSUMPTIONS**

This agreement is based on the following assumptions:

- This agreement is for planning and engineering up to 50% design services, including subcontracts.
- The work plan and scope of services will be similar to the comprehensive scope of services
  provided and successfully executed on previous Town projects.
- The design and required submittals, and subsequent professional services described herein, will be based on the project scope as set forth in August 2024 Town of Liberty - Fast NY Application - Liberty Business Park Application Water and Sewer Improvements Description.
- Costs for the services provided under this contract will be paid for using the \$1,000,000 CDS-EPA STAG grant funds and \$250,000 local match/cost share which is expected to be provided by Sullivan County, NY.
- The USEPA Grant Agreement with the Town of Liberty was executed on 9/17/25, with an anticipated contract end date of July 1, 2026.
- All work performed by Delaware Engineering will be 100% reimbursable under the terms of the USEPA grant.
- EPA grantees and subrecipients are required to seek and encouraged to utilize disadvantaged business enterprises (DBEs) for their procurement needs under the grant agreement.
- A separate work task has been included for addressing compliance with USEPA General Terms
  and Conditions (effective October 1, 2024). This work is done specifically to address USEPA
  financing needs and is not part of typical design/bid/construction work. In addition, significant
  costs are incurred soliciting quotes and coordinating subcontracts and, as such, Delaware will
  also seek compensation for this work under this work task.
- Invoices for services will be submitted to the Town, not more frequently than once per month.
   The Town intends to make payments to the Engineer within 30 calendar days and will submit

for reimbursement from USEPA quarterly.

 Because of the cross jurisdictional nature of the project, lead agency for SEQR review may be the Town or Sullivan County.

- 2. CHANGE OF SCOPE. The scope of Services set forth in this Agreement is based on facts known at the time of execution of this Agreement, including, if applicable, information supplied by CLIENT. For some projects involving conceptual or process development services, scope may not be fully definable during initial phases. As the Project progresses, facts discovered may indicate that scope must be redefined.
- 3. SAFETY. ENGINEER has established and maintains corporate programs and procedures for the safety of its employees. - In the event either party defaults in its obligations under this Agreement (including CLIENT'S obligation to make the payments required hereunder), the non-defaulting party may, after 7 days written notice stating its intention to suspend performance under the Agreement if cure of such default is not commenced and diligently continued, and failure of the defaulting party to commence cure within such time limit and diligently continue, suspend performance under this Agreement.
- 6. OPINIONS OF CONSTRUCTION COST. Any opinion of construction costs prepared by ENGINEER is supplied for the general guidance of the CLIENT only. Since ENGINEER has no control over competitive bidding or market conditions, ENGINEER cannot guarantee the accuracy of such opinions as compared to contract bids or actual costs to CLIENT.
- 7. RELATIONSHIP WITH CONTRACTORS. ENGINEER shall serve as CLIENT'S professional representative for the Services, and may make recommendations to CLIENT concerning actions relating to CLIENT'S contractors, but ENGINEER specifically disclaims any authority to direct or supervise the means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of construction selected by CLIENT'S contractors.
- 8. CONSTRUCTION REVIEW. For projects involving construction, CLIENT acknowledges that under generally accepted professional practice, interpretations of construction documents in the field are normally required, and that performance of construction-related services by the design professional for the project permits errors or omissions to be identified and corrected at comparatively low cost. CLIENT agrees to hold ENGINEER harmless from any claims resulting from performance of construction-related services by persons other than ENGINEER.
- 9. INSURANCE. ENGINEER will maintain insurance coverage for Professional, Comprehensive General, Automobile, Worker's Compensation, and Employer's Liability in amounts in accordance with legal, and ENGINEER'S business requirements. Certificates evidencing such coverage will be provided to CLIENT upon request. For projects involving construction, CLIENT agrees to require its construction contractor, if any, to include ENGINEER as an additional insured on its policies relating to the Project, ENGINEER'S coverages referenced above shall, in such case, be excess over contractor's primary coverage.
- 10. HAZARDOUS MATERIAL. Hazardous materials may exist at a site where there is no reason to believe they could or should be present. ENGINEER and CLIENT agree that the discovery of unanticipated hazardous materials constitutes a changed condition mandating a renegotiation of the scope of work. ENGINEER agrees to notify CLIENT as soon as practically possible should unanticipated hazardous materials or suspected hazardous materials be encountered. CLIENT acknowledges and agrees that it retains title to all hazardous material existing on the site and shall report to the appropriate federal, state or local public agencies, as required, any conditions at the site that may present a potential danger to the public health, safety or the environment. CLIENT shall execute any manifests or forms in connection with transportation, storage and disposal of hazardous materials resulting from the site or work on the site or shall authorize ENGINEER to execute such documents as CLIENT'S agent. CLIENT waives any claim against ENGINEER and agrees to defend, indemnify, and save ENGINEER harmless from any claim or liability for injury or loss arising from ENGINEER'S discovery of unanticipated hazardous materials or suspected hazardous materials.
- 11. INDEMNITIES. To the fullest extent permitted by law, CLIENT and ENGINEER each agree to indemnify and hold the other harmless, and their respective officers, employees, agents, and representatives, from and against liability for all claims, losses, damages, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys fees, to the extent such claims, losses, damages, or expenses are caused by the indemnifying party's negligent acts, errors, or omissions. In the event claims, losses, damages or expenses are caused by the joint or concurrent negligence of CLIENT and ENGINEER, they shall be borne by each party in proportion to its negligence.

### STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 12. LIMITATIONS OF LIABILITY. No employee or agent of ENGINEER shall have individual liability to CLIENT.
- CLIENT agrees that, to the fullest extent permitted by law, ENGINEER'S total liability to CLIENT for any and all injuries, claims, losses, expenses or damages whatsoever arising out of or in any way related to the Project or this Agreement from any causes including, but not limited to, ENGINEER'S negligence, errors, omissions, strict liability, or breach of contract and whether claimed directly or by way of contribution shall not exceed the limits of the ENGINEER'S insurance under this Agreement. If CLIENT desires a limit of liability greater than that provided above, CLIENT and ENGINEER shall include as an attachment to this Agreement the amount of such limit and the additional compensation to be paid to ENGINEER for assumption of such additional risk
- IN NO EVENT AND UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHALL ENGINEER BE LIABLE TO CLIENT FOR CONSEQUENTIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, SPECIAL, OR PUNITIVE DAMAGES
- ACCESS, CLIENT shall provide ENGINEER safe access to any premises necessary for ENGINEER to provide the Services.
- 14. REUSE OF PROJECT DELIVERABLES. Reuse of any documents or other deliverables, including electronic media, pertaining to the Project by CLIENT for any purpose other than that for which such documents or deliverables were originally prepared, or alteration of such documents or deliverables without written verification or adaptation by ENGINEER for the specific purpose intended, shall be at the CLIENT's risk. Further, all title blocks and the engineer's seal, if applicable, shall be removed if and when CLIENT provides deliverables in electronic media to another entity. CLIENT agrees that relevant analyses, findings and reports provided in electronic media shall also be provided in "hard copy" and that the hard copy shall govern in the case of a discrepancy between the two versions, and shall be held as the official set of drawings, as signed and sealed. CLIENT shall be afforded a period of 30 days in which to check the hard copy against the electronic media. In the event that any error or inconsistency is found as a result of this process, ENGINEER shall be advised and the inconsistency shall be corrected at no additional cost to CLIENT. Following the expiration of this 30-day period, CLIENT shall bear all responsibility for the care, custody and control of the electronic media. In addition, CLIENT represents that it shall retain the necessary mechanisms to read the electronic media, which CLIENT acknowledges to be of only limited duration. CLIENT agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless ENGINEER from all claims, damages, and expenses, (including reasonable litigation costs), arising out of such reuse or alteration by CLIENT or others acting through CLIENT.
- 15. AMENDMENT. This Agreement, upon execution by both parties hereto, can be amended only by a written instrument signed by both parties.
- 16. ASSIGNMENT. Except for assignments (a) to entities which control, or are controlled by, the parties hereto or (b) resulting from operation of law, the rights and obligations of this Agreement cannot be assigned by either party without written permission of the other party. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of any permitted assigns.
- 17. STATUTES OF LIMITATION. To the fullest extent permitted by law, parties agree that, except for claims for indemnification, the time period for bringing claims under this Agreement shall expire one year after Project completion.
- 18. DISPUTE RESOLUTION. Parties shall attempt to settle disputes arising under this agreement by discussion between the parties senior representatives of management. If any dispute can not be resolved in this manner, within a reasonable length of time, parties agree to attempt non-binding mediation or any other method of alternative dispute resolution prior to filing any legal proceedings.
- 19. NO WAIVER. No waiver by either party of any default by the other party in the performance of any particular section of this Agreement shall invalidate any other section of this Agreement or operate as a waiver of any future default, whether like or different in character.
- 20. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARY. Nothing contained in this Agreement, nor the performance of the parties hereunder, is intended to benefit, nor shall inure to the benefit of, any third party, including CLIENT'S contractors, if any.
- 21. SEVERABILITY. The various terms, provisions and covenants herein contained shall be deemed to be separate and severable, and the invalidity or unenforceability of any of them shall not affect or impair the validity or enforceability of the remainder.
- 22. AUTHORITY. The persons signing this Agreement warrant that they have the authority to sign as, or on behalf of, the party for whom they are signing.
- 23. COMPENSATION. ENGINEER will prepare and submit invoices to the CLIENT on a monthly basis. CLIENT shall make payment to the ENGINEER within 30 calendar days of the date of the invoice. Checks shall be forwarded to Delaware Engineering, D.P.C., 28 Madison Avenue Extension, Albany, NY 12203.
- 24. ADDITIONAL SERVICES. Additional services can be provided if deemed necessary and approved by the CLIENT. Compensation for additional services can be negotiated as needed. Additional work will be approved by the CLIENT prior to the execution of the additional tasks.
- Services not indicated or included in the above-listed scope of services or which are subsequently requested, either verbally or in writing, will be considered additional services. The fee will be based upon either a mutually agreed fixed fee or an hourly basis at rates in effect at the time the services are performed, plus subcontracts and reimbursable expenses as outlined in the Rate Schedule for the year in which the work is being performed.

### Preface

### 1. Introduction

- (a) These terms and conditions are in addition to the assurances and certifications made as part of the award and terms, conditions, and restrictions reflected on the official assistance award document. Recipients <u>must</u> review their official award document for additional administrative and programmatic requirements. Failure to comply with the general terms and conditions outlined below and those directly reflected on the official assistance award document may result in enforcement actions as outlined in <u>2 CFR 200.339</u> and <u>2 CFR 200.340</u>.
- (b) If the EPA General Terms and Conditions have been revised, EPA will update the terms and conditions when it provides additional funding (incremental or supplemental) prior to the end of the period of performance of this agreement. The recipient must comply with the revised terms and conditions after the effective date of the EPA action that leads to the revision. Revised terms and conditions do not apply to the recipient's expenditures of EPA funds or activities the recipient carries out prior to the effective date of the EPA action. EPA will inform the recipient of revised terms and conditions in the action adding additional funds.

### 2. Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards

This award is subject to the requirements of the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards; Title 2 CFR Part 200 and 2 CFR Part 1500. 2 CFR 1500.2, Adoption of 2 CFR Part 200, states the EPA adopts the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) guidance Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards to Non-Federal Entities (subparts A through F of 2 CFR Part 200), as supplemented by 2 CFR Part 1500, as the EPA policies and procedures for financial assistance administration. 2 CFR Part 1500 satisfies the requirements of 2 CFR 200.110(a) and gives regulatory effect to the OMB guidance as supplemented by 2 CFR Part 1500. This award is also subject to applicable requirements contained in EPA programmatic regulations located in 40 CFR Chapter 1 Subchapter B.

### 3. Termination (Updated 4/03/2025)

Consistent with 2 CFR 200.340, EPA may terminate this award in part or its entirety:

- (a) If a recipient or subrecipient fails to comply with the terms and conditions of the award, including statutory or regulatory requirements;
- (b) With the consent of the recipient when both the recipient and the EPA agree upon the termination conditions, which include the effective date and, in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated;
- (c) If a recipient sends the EPA a written notification of the reasons for such termination, the effective date, and in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated; however, if the EPA determines that the remaining portion of the Federal award will not accomplish the

- purposes for which the Federal award was made, the EPA may terminate the award in its entirety; or
- (d) Pursuant to the programmatic terms and conditions specified in the Federal award.
- (e) By the EPA or pass-through entity to the extent authorized by law, if an award no longer effectuates the program goals or agency priorities. This provision applies to all new awards and funding amendments (incremental and supplemental) made on or after April 3, 2025.

### Financial Information

### 4. Reimbursement Limitation

EPA's financial obligations to the recipient are limited by the amount of federal funding awarded to date as reflected on the award document. If the recipient incurs costs in anticipation of receiving additional funds from EPA, it does so at its own risk. See 2 CFR 1500.9.

- 5. Automated Standard Application Payments (ASAP) and Proper Payment Draw Down Electronic Payments. Recipients must be enrolled or enroll in the Automated Standard Application for Payments (ASAP) system to receive payments under EPA financial assistance agreements unless:
  - EPA grants a recipient-specific exception;
  - The assistance program has received a waiver from this requirement;
  - The recipient is exempt from this requirement under <u>31 CFR 208.4</u>; or,
  - The recipient is a fellowship recipient pursuant to 40 CFR Part 46.

EPA will not make payments to recipients until the ASAP enrollment is completed or if recipients fall under one of the above categories. EPA's Research Triangle Park Finance Center (RTPFC) will initiate the ASAP enrollment based on the key contact information on the grant application. The "payee" on the key contacts form will receive an email from ASAP indicating the steps required for completing the enrollment. Recipients may request exceptions using the procedures below.

Under this payment mechanism, the recipient initiates an electronic payment request online via ASAP, which is approved or rejected based on the amount of available funds authorized by EPA in the recipient's ASAP account. Approved payments are credited to the account at the financial institution of the recipient organization set up by the recipient during the ASAP enrollment process.

Additional information concerning ASAP and enrollment can be obtained by contacting the EPA RTPFC, at <a href="mailto:rtpfc-grants@epa.gov">rtpfc-grants@epa.gov</a>, or by visiting: <a href="https://www.fiscal.treasury.gov/asap/">https://www.fiscal.treasury.gov/asap/</a>.

EPA will grant exceptions to the ASAP enrollment requirement only in situations in which the recipient demonstrates to EPA that receiving payment via ASAP places an undue administrative or financial management burden on the recipient or EPA determines that granting the waiver is in the public interest. Recipients may request an exception to the requirement by following the procedures specified in <a href="RAIN-2018-G06-R">RAIN-2018-G06-R</a>.

### Proper Payment Drawdown (for recipients other than states)

- (a) As required by <u>2 CFR 200.305(b)</u>, the recipient must draw funds from ASAP only for the minimum amounts needed for actual and immediate cash requirements to pay employees, contractors, subrecipients or to satisfy other obligations for allowable costs under this assistance agreement. The timing and amounts of the drawdowns must be as close as administratively feasible to actual disbursements of EPA funds. Disbursement within 5 business days of drawdown will comply with this requirement and the recipient agrees to meet this standard when performing this award.
- (b) Recipients may not retain more than 5% of the amount drawn down, or \$1,000 whichever is less, 5 business days after drawdown to materially comply with the standard. Any EPA funds subject to this paragraph that remain undisbursed after 5 business days must be fully disbursed within 15 business days of draw down or be returned to EPA.
- (c) If the recipient draws down EPA funds in excess of that allowed by paragraph b., the recipient must contact <a href="mailto:rtpfc-grants@epa.gov">rtpfc-grants@epa.gov</a> for instructions on whether to return the funds to EPA. The recipient must comply with the requirements at <a href="mailto:2 CFR 200.305(b)(11">2 CFR 200.305(b)(11)</a> regarding depositing advances of Federal funds in interest bearing accounts.
- (d) Returning Funds: <a href="Pay.gov">Pay.gov</a> is the preferred mechanism to return funds. It is free, secure, paperless, expedient, and does not require the recipient//vendor to create an account. Contact RTPFC-Grants at <a href="rttpfc-grants@epa.gov">rttpfc-grants@epa.gov</a> to obtain complete instructions. Additional information is available at the <a href="Pay.gov website">Pay.gov website</a>. Information on how to repay EPA via check is available at <a href="https://www.epa.gov/financial/makepayment">https://www.epa.gov/financial/makepayment</a>. Instructions on how to return funds to EPA electronically via ASAP are available at <a href="https://www.fiscal.treasury.gov/asap/">https://www.fiscal.treasury.gov/asap/</a>.
- (e) Failure on the part of the recipient to materially comply with this condition may, in addition to EPA recovery of the un-disbursed portions of the drawn down funds, lead to changing the payment method from advance payment to a reimbursable basis. EPA may also take other remedies for noncompliance under <u>2 CFR 200.208</u> and/or <u>2 CFR 200.339</u>.
- (f) If the recipient believes that there are extraordinary circumstances that prevent it from complying with the 5-business day disbursement requirement throughout the performance period of this agreement, recipients may request an exception to the requirement by following the procedures specified in <a href="RAIN-2018-G06-R">RAIN-2018-G06-R</a>. EPA will grant exceptions to the 5-business day disbursement requirement only if the recipient demonstrates that compliance places an undue administrative or financial management burden or EPA determines that granting the exception is in the public interest. EPA will grant exceptions to the 5-business day disbursement requirement only if the recipient demonstrates that compliance places an undue administrative or financial management burden or EPA determines that granting the exception is in the public interest.

### **Proper Payment Drawdown for State Recipients**

In accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.305(a)</u>, payments are governed by Treasury-State Cash Management Improvement Act (CMIA) agreements and default procedures codified <u>at 31 CFR Part 205, Subparts A and B</u> and <u>Treasury Financial Manual (TFM) 4A-2000, "Overall Disbursing Rules for All Federal Agencies"</u> unless a program specific regulation (e.g. 40 CFR 35.3160 or 40 CFR 35.3560) provides

otherwise. Pursuant to 31 CFR Part 205, <u>Subpart A—Rules Applicable to Federal Assistance Programs Included in a Treasury-State Agreement</u>, States follow their Treasury-State CMIA Agreement for major Federal programs listed in the agreement. For those programs not listed as major in the Treasury-State agreement, the State follows the default procedures in 31 CFR Part 205, <u>Subpart B—Rules Applicable to Federal Assistance Programs Not Included in a Treasury-State Agreement</u>, which directs State recipients to draw-down and disburse Federal financial assistance funds in anticipation of immediate cash needs of the State for work under the award. States must comply with <u>2 CFR 200.302(a)</u> in reconciling costs incurred and charged to EPA financial assistance agreements at time of close out unless a program specific regulation provides otherwise.

### Selected Items of Cost

6. Prohibition on Certain Telecommunications and Video Surveillance Service Equipment or Services Prohibition on covered telecommunications and video surveillance services or equipment is effective on all obligations and expenditures of EPA financial assistance funding as of August 13, 2020, including awards made before that date.

As required by <u>2 CFR 200.216</u>, EPA recipients and subrecipients, including borrowers under EPA-funded revolving loan fund programs, are prohibited from obligating or expending Federal loan or grant funds to procure or obtain covered telecommunications equipment or services; extend or renew a contract to procure or obtain covered telecommunications equipment or services; or enter into a contract (or extend or renew a contract) to procure or obtain covered telecommunications equipment or services. As described in section 889 of <u>Public Law 115-232</u>, "covered telecommunications equipment or services" means any of the following:

- 1. Telecommunications equipment produced by Huawei Technologies Company or ZTE Corporation (or any subsidiary or affiliate of such entities);
- 2. For the purpose of public safety, security of government facilities, physical security surveillance of critical infrastructure, and other national security purposes, video surveillance and telecommunications equipment produced by Hytera Communications Corporation, Hangzhou Hikvision Digital Technology Company, or Dahua Technology Company (or any subsidiary or affiliate of such entities);
- Telecommunications or video surveillance services provided by such entities or using such equipment;
- 4. Telecommunications or video surveillance equipment or services produced or provided by an entity that the Secretary of Defense, in consultation with the Director of the National Intelligence or the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, reasonably believes to be an entity owned or controlled by, or otherwise connected to, the government of a covered foreign country.

Pursuant to <u>2 CFR 200.216(c)</u>, "covered telecommunications equipment or services" also include systems that use covered telecommunications equipment or services as a substantial or essential component of any system, or as critical technology as part of any system. Consistent with <u>2 CFR</u>

<u>200.471</u>, costs incurred for telecommunications and video surveillance services or equipment such as phones, internet, video surveillance, and cloud servers are allowable except for the following circumstances:

- (a) Obligating or expending EPA funds for covered telecommunications and video surveillance services or equipment or services as described in 2 CFR 200.216 to:
  - (1) Procure or obtain, extend or renew a contract to procure or obtain;
  - (2) Enter into a contract (or extend or renew a contract) to procure; or
  - (3) Obtain the equipment, services, or systems.

Certain prohibited equipment, systems, or services, including equipment, systems, or services produced or provided by entities identified in section 889 of <a href="Public Law 115-232">Public Law 115-232</a>, are recorded in the <a href="System for Award Management">System for Award Management</a> exclusion list.

### 7. Consultant Cap

EPA participation in the salary rate (excluding overhead) paid to individual consultants retained by recipients or by a recipient's contractors or subcontractors shall be limited to the maximum daily rate for a Level IV of the Executive Schedule, available at: <a href="https://www.opm.gov/policy-data-oversight/pay-leave/salaries-wages/">https://www.opm.gov/policy-data-oversight/pay-leave/salaries-wages/</a>, to be adjusted annually. This limit applies to consultation services of designated individuals with specialized skills who are paid at a daily or hourly rate. This rate does not include transportation and subsistence costs for travel performed (the recipient will pay these in accordance with their normal travel reimbursement practices).

Information on how to calculate the maximum daily rate and the daily pay limitation is available at the Office Of Personnel Management's <u>Fact Sheet: How to Compute Rates of Pay</u> and <u>Fact Sheet: Expert and Consultant Pay.</u> Specifically, to determine the maximum daily rate, follow these steps:

- (1) Divide the Level IV salary by 2087 to determine the hourly rate. Rates must be rounded to the nearest cent, counting one-half cent and over as the next higher cent (e.g., round \$18.845 to \$18.85).
- (2) Multiply the hourly rate by 8 hours. The product is the maximum daily rate.

Contracts and subcontracts with firms for services that are awarded using the procurement requirements in Subpart D of 2 CFR Part 200 are not affected by this limitation unless the terms of the contract provide the recipient with responsibility for the selection, direction and control of the individuals who will be providing services under the contract at an hourly or daily rate of compensation. See <u>2 CFR 1500.10</u>.

### 8. Establishing and Managing Subawards (Updated 4/03/2025)

If the recipient chooses to pass funds from this assistance agreement to other entities, the recipient must comply with applicable subaward provisions of 2 CFR Part 200 and the <u>EPA Subaward Policy</u>.

As a pass-through entity, the recipient agrees to:

- Select subrecipients and conduct subaward competitions, as appropriate, using a system that properly differentiates between subrecipients and procurement contractors consistent with the differentiating characteristics explained in 2 CFR 200.331 and EPA's supplemental guidance in <u>Appendix A of the EPA Subaward Policy</u>.
- Verify that the potential subrecipient is not excluded or disqualified in accordance with the verification methods provided in <u>2 CFR 180.300</u>, such as confirming in SAM.gov that a potential subrecipient is not suspended, debarred, or otherwise excluded from receiving Federal funds.
- 3. Establish and follow a system that ensures all subaward agreements are in writing and contain all of the elements required by <u>2 CFR 200.332(b)</u>. EPA has developed a template for subaward agreements that is available in <u>Appendix D of the EPA Subaward Policy</u>.
- 4. Prior to making subawards, ensure that each subrecipient has a "Unique Entity Identifier" (UEI). The UEI is required by 2 CFR Part 25 and 2 CFR 200.332(b).   - c. Limitations on individual consultant fees as set forth in <u>2 CFR 1500.10</u> and the General Condition of the pass-through entity's agreement with EPA entitled "Consultant Fee Cap."
  - d. EPA's prohibition on paying management fees as set forth in General Condition of the pass-through entity's agreement with EPA entitled "Management Fees."
  - e. The Procurement Standards in <u>2 CFR Part 200</u> including those requiring competition when the subrecipient acquires goods and services from

- contractors (including consultants) and Domestic preferences for procurements at 2 CFR 200.322.
- f. Other statutes, regulations and Executive Orders that may apply to subawards are described at <u>Information on Requirements that Pass-Through Entities must "Flow Down" to Subrecipients</u>. Many Federal requirements are agreement- or program-specific, and EPA encourages pass-through entities to review the terms of their assistance agreement carefully and consult with their EPA Project Officer for advice if necessary.
- 6. - milestones or objectives of the subaward.
- 10. Establish and maintain an accounting system which ensures compliance with the \$50,000 limitation at 2 CFR 200.1, Modified Total Direct Costs, if applicable, on including subaward costs in Modified Total Direct Costs for the purposes of distributing indirect costs. Recipients with Federally approved indirect cost rates that use a different basis for distributing indirect costs to subawards must comply with their Indirect Cost Rate Agreement.
- 11. Work with EPA's Project Officer to obtain the written consent of EPA's Office of International and Tribal Affairs (OITA) prior to awarding a subaward to a foreign or international organization or a subaward to be performed in a foreign country, even if that subaward is described in a proposed scope of work.
- 12. Obtain prior written approval from the EPA's Award Official for any subawards or subaward activities that are not described in the approved work plan in accordance with 2 CFR 200.308. As provided in 2 CFR 200.308(f)(6), recipients must obtain prior approval to change a named subrecipient from the EPA Award Official if the pass-through entity described the original subrecipient's qualifications and/or performance history in the competitive application. Recipients must contact their Project Officer to begin the prior approval process.
- 13. Obtain prior written approval from the EPA's Award Official before awarding a subaward to an individual if the EPA-approved scope of work does not include a description of subawards to individuals.
- 14. Establish and follow written procedures under 2 CFR 200.302(b)(7) for determining that subaward costs are allowable in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart E and the terms and conditions of this award. These procedures may provide for allowability determinations on a pre-award basis, through ongoing monitoring of costs that subrecipients incur, or a combination of both approaches provided the pass-through entity documents its determinations.
- 15. By accepting this award, the recipient is certifying that it either has systems in place to comply

### 9. Management Fees

Management Fees or similar charges in excess of the direct costs and approved indirect rates are <u>not</u> allowable. The term "management fees or similar charges" refers to expenses added to the direct costs in order to accumulate and reserve funds for ongoing business expenses; unforeseen liabilities; or for other similar costs which are not allowable under this assistance agreement. Management fees or similar charges may not be used to improve or expand the project funded under this agreement, except to the extent authorized as a direct cost of carrying out the scope of work.

### 10. Federal Employee Costs

The recipient understands that none of the funds for this project (including funds contributed by the recipient as cost sharing) may be used to pay for the travel of Federal employees or for other costs associated with Federal participation in this project unless a Federal agency will be providing services to the recipient as authorized by a Federal statute.

### 11. Foreign Travel

EPA policy requires that all foreign travel must be approved by its Office of International and Tribal Affairs. The recipient agrees to obtain prior EPA approval before using funds available under this agreement for international travel unless the trip(s) are already described in the EPA approved budget for this agreement. Foreign travel includes trips to Mexico and Canada but does not include trips to Puerto Rico, the U.S. Territories or possessions. Recipients that request post-award approval to travel frequently to Mexico and Canada by motor vehicle (e.g., for sampling or meetings) may describe their proposed travel in general terms in their request for EPA approval. Requests for prior approval must be submitted to the Project Officer for this agreement.

### 12. The Fly America Act and Foreign Travel

The recipient understands that all foreign travel **funded under this assistance agreement** must comply with the Fly America Act. All travel must be on U.S. air carriers certified under 49 U.S.C. Section 40118, to the extent that service by such carriers is available even if foreign air carrier costs are less than the American air carrier.

### 13. Union Organizing

Grant funds may not be used to support or oppose union organizing, whether directly or as an offset for other funds.

### Reporting and Additional Post-Award Requirements

### 14. System for Award Management and Universal Identifier Requirements

- Requirement for System for Award Management (SAM) Unless exempted from this requirement under 2 CFR 25.110, the recipient must maintain current and active registrationSAM.gov. b. Reporting Requirements. Subrecipients must report their executive total compensation described in paragraph 15.3.a. of this award term to the recipient. - d. Subrecipient has the meaning given in 2 CFR 200.1.
- e. Total compensation means the cash and noncash dollar value an executive earns during the recipient's or subrecipient's preceding fiscal year. This includes all items of compensation as prescribed in <u>17 CFR 229.402(c)(2)</u>).

# 16. Recipient Integrity and Performance Matters – Reporting of Matters Related to Recipient Integrity and Performance

### 16.1 General Reporting Requirement

**16.2.c.4.3.** The requirement in this award term and condition to disclose information about the proceeding does not conflict with applicable laws and regulations.

### 16.3 Reporting Procedures

Enter in SAM.gov Entity Management area the information that SAM.gov requires about each proceeding described in paragraph 2 of this award term and condition. You do not need to submit the information a second time under assistance awards that you received if you already provided the information through SAM.gov because you were required to do so under Federal procurement contracts that you were awarded.

### 16.4 Reporting Frequency

It does not include audits, site visits, corrective plans, or inspection of deliverables.
- b. Conviction, for purposes of this award term and condition, means a judgment or conviction of a criminal offense by any court of competent jurisdiction, whether entered upon a verdict or a plea, and includes a conviction entered upon a plea of nolo contendere.
- c. Total value of currently active grants, cooperative agreements, and procurement contracts includes
  - **16.5.c.1.** Only the Federal share of the funding under any Federal award with a recipient cost share or match; and
  - **16.5.c.2.** The value of all expected funding increments under a Federal award and options, even if not yet exercised.

### 17. Federal Financial Reporting (FFR)

Pursuant to <u>2 CFR 200.328</u> and <u>2 CFR 200.344</u>, EPA recipients must submit the Federal Financial Report (SF-425) at least annually and no more frequently than quarterly. The RTPFC will make adjustments as necessary, to obligated funds after reviewing and accepting a final Federal Financial Report. Recipients will be notified and instructed by EPA if they must complete any additional forms for the closeout of the assistance agreement.

### 18. Indirect Cost Rate Agreements

This term and condition provides requirements for recipients using EPA funds for indirect costs and applies to all EPA assistance agreements unless there are <u>statutory or regulatory limits on IDCs</u>. See also <u>EPA's Indirect Cost Policy for Recipients of EPA Assistance Agreements</u> (IDC Policy).

- EPA-approved use of an expired fixed rate with carry-forward on an exception basis, as detailed in section 6.4.a. of the IDC Policy
- "Exempt" state of local governmental departments or agencies are agencies that receive up
  to and including \$35,000,000 in Federal funding per the department or agency's fiscal year
  and must have an IDC rate proposal developed in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Appendix
  VII, with documentation maintained and available for audit.
- Institutions of Higher Education must use the IDC rate(s) on the approved rate agreement in place at the time of award during the life of the assistance agreement (unless the rate was provisional at time of award, in which case the rate will change once it becomes final). As provided by 2 CFR Part 200, Appendix III(C)(7), the term "life of the assistance agreement", means each competitive segment of the project. If negotiated rate agreements do not extend through the life of the Federal award at the time of the initial award, then the negotiated rate for the last year of the Federal award must be extended through the end of the award. Additional information is available in the regulation.

IDCs incurred during any period of the assistance agreement that are not covered by the provisions above are not allowable costs and must not be drawn down by the recipient. This term and condition does not govern indirect rates for subrecipients or recipient procurement contractors under EPA assistance agreements. Pass-through entities are required to comply with 2 CFR 200.332(b)(4)(i) and (ii) when establishing indirect cost rates for subawards.

# 19. Audit Requirements

In accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.501(a)</u>, the recipient hereby agrees to obtain a single audit from an independent auditor, if their organization expends \$1,000,000 or more in total Federal funds in their fiscal year for that year.

The recipient must submit a single audit report within 9 months of the end of the recipient's fiscal year or 30 days after receiving the report from an independent auditor. # 21. Suspension and Debarment

Recipient shall fully comply with Subpart C of 2 C.F.R. Part 180 entitled, "Responsibilities of Participants Regarding Transactions Doing Business With Other Persons," as implemented and supplemented by 2 C.F.R. Part 1532. Recipient is responsible for ensuring that any lower tier covered transaction, as described in Subpart B of 2 C.F.R. Part 180, entitled "Covered Transactions," and 2 C.F.R. § 1532.220, includes a term or condition requiring compliance with 2 C.F.R. Part 180, Subpart C. Recipient is responsible for further requiring the inclusion of a similar term and condition in any subsequent lower tier covered transactions. Recipient acknowledges that failing to disclose the information required under 2 C.F.R. § 180.335 to the EPA office that is entering into the transaction with the recipient may result in the delay or negation of this assistance agreement, or pursuance of administrative remedies, including suspension and debarment. Recipients may access the SAM.gov exclusion list at <a href="https://sam.gov/SAM/">https://sam.gov/SAM/</a> to determine whether an entity or individual is presently excluded or disqualified.

# 22. Representation by Corporations Regarding Delinquent Tax Liability or a Felony Conviction under any Federal Law

This award is subject to the provisions contained in an appropriations act(s) which prohibits the Federal Government from entering into a contract, memorandum of understanding, or cooperative agreement with, make a grant to, or provide a loan or loan guarantee to any corporation having a delinquent Federal tax liability or a felony conviction under any Federal law, unless the agency has considered suspension or debarment of the corporation and has made a determination that this further action is not necessary to protect the interests of the Government. A "corporation" is a legal entity that is separate and distinct from the entities that own, manage, or control it. It is organized and incorporated under the jurisdictional authority of a governmental body, such as a State or the District of Columbia. A corporation may be a for-profit or non-profit organization.

As required by the appropriations act(s) prohibitions, the Government will not enter into a contract, memorandum of understanding, or cooperative agreement with, make a grant to, or provide a loan or loan guarantee with any corporation that — (1) Has any unpaid Federal tax liability that has been assessed, for which all judicial and administrative remedies have been exhausted or have lapsed, and that is not being paid in a timely manner pursuant to an agreement with the authority responsible for collecting the tax liability, where the awarding agency is aware of the unpaid tax liability, unless an agency has considered suspension or debarment of the corporation and made a determination that suspension or debarment is not necessary to protect the interests of the Government; or (2) Was convicted of a felony criminal violation under any Federal law within the preceding 24 months, where the awarding agency is aware of the conviction, unless an agency has

considered suspension or debarment of the corporation and made a determination that this action is not necessary to protect the interests of the Government.

By accepting this award, the recipient represents that it is not a corporation that has any unpaid Federal tax liability that has been assessed, for which all judicial and administrative remedies have been exhausted or have lapsed, and that is not being paid in a timely manner pursuant to an agreement with the authority responsible for collecting the tax liability; and it is not a corporation that was convicted of a felony criminal violation under a Federal law within the preceding 24 months.

Alternatively, by accepting this award, the recipient represents that it disclosed unpaid Federal tax liability information and/or Federal felony conviction information to the EPA. The recipient may accept this award if the EPA Suspension and Debarment Official has considered suspension or debarment of the corporation based on tax liabilities and/or Federal felony convictions and determined that suspension or debarment is not necessary to protect the Government's interests.

If the recipient fails to comply with this term and condition, EPA will annul this agreement and may recover any funds the recipient has expended in violation of the appropriations act(s) prohibition(s). The EPA may also pursue other administrative remedies as outlined in <u>2 CFR 200.339</u> and <u>2 CFR 200.339</u> and and may also pursue suspension and debarment.

# 23. Disclosing Conflict of Interest

# 23.1 For Awards to Recipients, Subrecipients, and Individuals (other than states and fellowship recipients under 40 CFR Part 46)

As required by <u>2 CFR 200.112</u>, EPA has established a policy (COI Policy) for disclosure of conflicts of interest (COI) that may affect EPA financial assistance awards. For competitive awards, recipients must disclose any competition related COI described in section 4.0(a) of the COI Policy that are discovered after award to the EPA Grants Specialist listed on the Assistance Agreement/Amendment within 30 calendar days of discovery of the COI. The Grant Specialist will respond to any such disclosure within 30 calendar days.

EPA's COI Policy requires that recipients have systems in place to address, resolve and disclose to EPA COIs described in sections 4.0(b), (c) and/or (d) of the COI Policy that affect any contract or subaward regardless of amount funded under this award. The recipient's COI Point of Contact for the award must disclose any COI to the EPA Grants Specialist listed on the Assistance Agreement/Amendment within 30 calendar days of the discovery of the potential COI and their approach for resolving the COI.

EPA's COI Policy requires that subrecipients have systems in place to address, resolve and disclose COI's described in section 4.0(b)(c) and (d) of the COI Policy regardless of the amount of the transaction. Recipients who are pass-through entities as defined at 2 CFR 200.1 must require that subrecipients being considered for or receiving subawards disclose COI to the pass-through entities in a manner that, at a minimum, is in accordance with sections 5.0(d) and 7.0(c) of EPA's COI Policy. Pass-through entities must disclose the subrecipient COI along with the approach for resolving the COI to the EPA Grants Specialist listed on the Assistance Agreement/Amendment within 30 calendar days of receiving notification of the COI by the subrecipient.

EPA only requires that recipients and subrecipients disclose COI's that are discovered under their systems for addressing and resolving COI. If recipients or subrecipients do not discover a COI, they do not need to advise EPA or the pass-through entity of the absence of a COI.

Upon notice from the recipient of a potential COI and the approach for resolving it, the Agency will then make a determination regarding the effectiveness of these measures within 30 days of receipt of the recipient's notice unless a longer period is necessary due to the complexity of the matter. Recipients may not request payment from EPA for costs for transactions subject to the COI pending notification of EPA's determination. Failure to disclose a COI may result in cost disallowances.

Disclosure of potential COI will not necessarily result in EPA disallowing costs, with the exception of procurement contracts that the Agency determines violate <u>2 CFR 200.318(c)(1)</u> or (2), provided the recipient notifies EPA of measures the recipient or subrecipient has taken to eliminate, neutralize or mitigate the conflict of interest when making the disclosure.

# 23.2 For Awards to States Including State Universities that are State Agencies or Instrumentalities

As required by <u>2 CFR 200.112</u>, EPA has established a policy (COI Policy) for disclosure of conflicts of interest (COI) that may affect EPA financial assistance awards. For competitive awards, recipients must disclose any competition related COI described in section 4.0(a) of the COI Policy that are discovered after award to the EPA Grants Specialist listed on the Assistance Agreement/Amendment within 30 calendar days of discovery of the COI. The Grants Specialist will respond to any such disclosure within 30 calendar days.

States including state universities that are state agencies and instrumentalities receiving funding from EPA are only required to disclose subrecipient COI as a pass-through entity as

defined by <u>2 CFR 200.1</u>. Any other COI are subject to state laws, regulations, and policies. EPA's COI Policy requires that subrecipients have systems in place to address, resolve and disclose COIs described in section 4.0(b)(c) and (d) of the COI Policy that arise after EPA made the award regardless of the amount of the transaction. States who are pass-through entities as defined at <u>2 CFR 200.1</u> must require that subrecipients being considered for or receiving subawards disclose COI to the state in a manner that, as a minimum, in accordance with sections 5.0(d) and 7.0(c) of EPA's COI Policy. States must disclose the subrecipient COI along with the approach for resolving the COI to the EPA Grants Specialist listed on the Assistance Agreement/Amendment within 30 calendar days of receiving notification of the COI by the subrecipient.

EPA only requires that subrecipients disclose COI's to state pass-through entities that are discovered under their systems for addressing, resolving, and disclosing COI. If subrecipients do not discover a COI, they do not need to advise state pass-through entities of the absence of a COI.

Upon receiving notice of a potential COI and the approach for resolving it, the Agency will make a determination regarding the effectiveness of these measures within 30 days of receipt of the state's notice of a subrecipient COI unless a longer period is necessary due to the complexity of the matter. States may not request payment from EPA for costs for transactions subject to the COI pending notification of EPA's determination. A subrecipient's failure to disclose a COI to the state and EPA may result in cost disallowances.

Disclosure of potential subrecipient COI will not necessarily result in EPA disallowing costs, with the exception of procurement contracts that the Agency determines violate <u>2 CFR</u> <u>200.318(c)(1) or (2)</u>, provided the subrecipient has taken measures that EPA and the state agree eliminate, neutralize or mitigate the conflict of interest.

#### 24. Transfer of Funds

#### 24.1 Transfer of Funds

Applicable to all assistance agreements other than Continuing Environmental Program Grants subject to 40 CFR 35.114 and 40 CFR 35.514 when EPA's share of the total award exceeds the Simplified Acquisition Threshold. Simplified Acquisition Threshold is defined at 2 CFR 200.1 and is currently set at \$250,000 but the amount is subject to adjustment.

(1) As provided at <u>2 CFR 200.308(i)</u>, the recipient must obtain prior approval from EPA's Grants Management Officer if the cumulative amount of funding transfers among direct budget categories or programs, functions and activities exceeds 10% of the total budget, as last approved by EPA, including cost share. Recipients must submit requests for prior approval to the Grant Specialist and Grants Management Officer with a copy to the Project Officer for this agreement.

(2) Recipients must notify EPA's Grant Specialist and Project Officer of cumulative funding transfers among direct budget categories or programs, functions and activities that do not exceed 10% of the total budget for the agreement. Prior approval by EPA's Grants Management Officer is required if the transfer involves any of the items listed in <u>2 CFR</u> <u>200.407</u> that EPA did not previously approve at time of award or in response to a previous post-award request by the recipient.

24.2 Post-Award Changes for Continuing Environmental Program Grants
Applicable to Continuing Environmental Program Grants subject to 40 CFR 35.114 and 40 CFR
35.514 when EPA's share of the total project costs exceeds the Simplified Acquisition Threshold.
Simplified Acquisition Threshold is defined at 2 CFR 200.1 and is currently set at \$250,000 but the amount is subject to adjustment.

To determine if a post-award change in work plan commitments is significant and requires prior written approval for the purposes of 40 CFR §35.114(a) or 40 CFR §35.514(a), the recipient agrees to consult the EPA Project Officer (PO) before making the change. The term work plan commitments is defined at 40 CFR §35.102. If the PO determines the change is significant, the recipient cannot make the change without prior written approval by the EPA Award Official or Grants Management Officer.

The recipient must obtain written approval from the EPA Award Official prior to transferring funds from one budget category to another if the EPA Award Official determines that such transfer significantly changes work plan commitment(s). All transfers must be reported in required performance reports. In addition, unless approved with the budget at the time of award, Continuing Environmental Program (CEP) recipients must also obtain prior written approval from the EPA Award Official or Grants Management Officer to use EPA funds for directly charging compensation for administrative and clerical personnel under 2 CFR 200.413(c) and the General Provisions for Selected Items of Cost allowability at 2 CFR 200.420 through 2 CFR 200.476 as supplemented by EPA's Guidance on Selected Items of Cost. The recipient is not required to obtain prior written approval from the EPA Award Official for other items requiring prior EPA approval listed in 2 CFR 200.407.

# 25. Electronic/Digital Signatures on Financial Assistance Agreement Form(s)/Document(s)

Throughout the life of this assistance agreement, the recipient agrees to ensure that any form(s)/document(s) required to be signed by the recipient and submitted to EPA through any means including but not limited to hard copy via U.S. mail or express mail, hand delivery or through electronic means such as e-mail are: (1) signed by the individual identified on the form/document, and (2) the signer has the authority to sign the form/document for the recipient. Submission of any signed form(s)/document(s) is subject to any provisions of law on making false statements (e.g., 18 U.S.C. 1001).

# 26. Extension of Project/Budget Period Expiration Date

EPA has not exercised the waiver option to allow automatic one-time extensions for non-research grants under 2 CFR 200.308(g)(2). Therefore, if a no-cost time extension is necessary to extend the period of availability of funds, the recipient must submit a written request to the EPA at least 10 calendar days before the conclusion of the period of performance as required by 2 CFR 200.308(f)(10). The written request must include: a justification describing the need for additional time, an estimated date of completion, and a revised schedule for project completion including updated milestone target dates for the approved workplan activities. In addition, if there are overdue reports required by the general, administrative, and/or programmatic terms and conditions of this assistance agreement, the recipient must ensure that they are submitted along with or prior to submitting the no-cost time extension request.

# 27. Utilization of Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (Updated 4/03/2025) General Compliance, 40 CFR, Part 33

The recipient agrees to comply with the requirements of EPA's Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program for procurement activities under assistance agreements, contained in 40 CFR, Part 33.

The following text provides updates to 40 CFR Part 33 based upon the associated class exception or highlights a requirement.

# 1) EPA MBE/WBE CERTIFICATION, 40 CFR, Part 33, Subpart B

The EPA no longer certifies entities as Minority-Owned Business Entities (MBEs) or Women-Owned Business Entities (WBEs) pursuant to a class exception issued in October 2019. The class exception was authorized pursuant to the authority in <u>2 CFR, Section 1500.4(b)</u>.

# 2) SIX GOOD FAITH EFFORTS, 40 CFR, Part 33, Subpart C

Pursuant to 40 CFR Section 33.301, the recipient agrees to make good faith efforts whenever procuring construction, equipment, services and supplies under an EPA financial assistance agreement, and to require that sub-recipients, loan recipients, and prime contractors also comply. Records documenting compliance with the six good faith efforts shall be retained. The specific six good faith efforts can be found at: 40 CFR Section 33.301 (a)-(f).

However, in EPA assistance agreements that are for the benefit of Native Americans, the recipient must solicit and recruit Native American organizations and Native American-owned economic enterprises and give them preference in the award process prior to undertaking the six good faith efforts (40 CFR Section 33.304). If recruiting efforts are unsuccessful, the recipient must follow the six good faith efforts.

#### 3) CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION PROVISIONS, 40 CFR, Section 33.302

The recipient agrees to comply with the contract administration provisions of 40 CFR Section 33.302 (a)-(d) and (i).

# 4) BIDDERS LIST, 40 CFR Section 33.501(b) and (c)

Recipients of a Continuing Environmental Program Grant or other annual reporting grant, agree to create and maintain a bidders list. Recipients of an EPA financial assistance agreement to capitalize a revolving loan fund also agree to require entities receiving identified loans to create and maintain a bidders list if the recipient of the loan is subject to, or chooses to follow, competitive bidding requirements. Please see 40 CFR Section 33.501 (b) and (c) for specific requirements and exemptions.

# 5) FAIR SHARE OBJECTIVES, 40 CFR, Part 33, Subpart D

The EPA is suspending negotiations of fair share objectives with recipients under 40 CFR Part 33, Subpart D pursuant to a class exception issued on March 17, 2025. The class exception was authorized pursuant to the authority in 2 CFR, Section 1500.4(b).

# 6) MBE/WBE REPORTING, 40 CFR, Part 33, Subpart E

The EPA is suspending recipient reporting requirements under 40 CFR 33.502 pursuant to a class exception issued on March 17, 2025. The class exception was authorized pursuant to the authority in 2 CFR, Section 1500.4(b).

# 7) MBE/WBE RECORDKEEPING, 40 CFR, Part 33, Subpart E

The EPA is suspending recipient recordkeeping requirements under 40 CFR Part 33, Subpart E pursuant to a class exception issued on March 17, 2025. The class exception was authorized pursuant to the authority in 2 CFR, Section 1500.4(b).

# **Programmatic General Terms and Conditions**

#### 28. Sufficient Progress

EPA will measure sufficient progress by examining the performance required under the workplan in conjunction with the milestone schedule, the time remaining for performance within the project period and/or the availability of funds necessary to complete the project. EPA may terminate the assistance agreement for failure to ensure reasonable completion of the project within the project period.

#### 29. Copyrighted Material and Data

In accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.315</u>, EPA has the right to reproduce, publish, use and authorize others to reproduce, publish and use copyrighted works or other data developed under this assistance agreement for Federal purposes. This includes the right to require recipients and subrecipients to make such works available through agency-designated public access repositories.

Examples of a Federal purpose include but are not limited to: (1) Use by EPA and other Federal employees for official Government purposes; (2) Use by Federal contractors performing specific tasks for [i.e., authorized by] the Government; (3) Publication in EPA documents provided the document does not disclose trade secrets (e.g. software codes) and the work is properly attributed to the recipient through citation or otherwise; (4) Reproduction of documents for inclusion in

Federal depositories; (5) Use by State, Tribal and local governments that carry out delegated Federal environmental programs as "co-regulators" or act as official partners with EPA to carry out a national environmental program within their jurisdiction and; (6) Limited use by other recipients to carry out Federal grants provided the use is consistent with the terms of EPA's authorization to the other recipient to use the copyrighted works or other data.

Under Item 6, the recipient acknowledges that EPA may authorize another recipient(s) to use the copyrighted works or other data developed under this grant as a result of:

- The selection of another recipient by EPA to perform a project that will involve the use of the copyrighted works or other data, or
- · Termination or expiration of this agreement.

In addition, EPA may authorize another recipient to use copyrighted works or other data developed with Agency funds provided under this grant to perform another grant when such use promotes efficient and effective use of Federal grant funds.

#### 30. Patents and Inventions

Rights to inventions made under this assistance agreement are subject to federal patent and licensing regulations, which are codified at Title 37 CFR Part 401 and Title 35 USC Sections 200-212.

Pursuant to the Bayh-Dole Act (set forth in 35 USC 200-212), EPA retains the right to a worldwide, nonexclusive, nontransferable, irrevocable, paid-up license to practice the invention owned by the assistance agreement holder, as defined in the Act. To streamline the invention reporting process and to facilitate compliance with the Bayh-Dole Act, the recipient must utilize the Interagency Edison extramural invention reporting system at <a href="https://www.nist.gov/iedison">https://www.nist.gov/iedison</a>. Annual utilization reports must be submitted through the system. The recipient is required to notify the Project Officer identified on the award document when an invention report, patent report, or utilization report is filed at <a href="https://www.nist.gov/iedison">https://www.nist.gov/iedison</a>. EPA elects not to require the recipient to provide a report prior to the close-out of a funding agreement listing all subject inventions or stating that there were none.

In accordance with Executive Order 12591, as amended, government owned and operated laboratories can enter into cooperative research and development agreements with other federal laboratories, state and local governments, universities, and the private sector, and license, assign, or waive rights to intellectual property "developed by the laboratory either under such cooperative research or development agreements and from within individual laboratories."

#### 31. Acknowledgement Requirements for Non-ORD Assistance Agreements

The recipient agrees that any reports, documents, publications, or other materials developed for public distribution supported by this assistance agreement shall contain the following statement: "This project has been funded wholly or in part by the United States Environmental Protection Agency under assistance agreement (number) to (recipient). The contents of this document do not necessarily reflect the views and policies of the Environmental Protection Agency, nor does the

Environmental Protection Agency endorse trade names or recommend the use of commercial products mentioned in this document, as well as any images, video, text, or other content created by generative artificial intelligence tools, nor does any such content necessarily reflect the views and policies of the Environmental Protection Agency."

Recipients of EPA Office of Research Development (ORD) research awards must follow the acknowledgement requirements outlined in the research T&Cs available at: <a href="https://www.nsf.gov/awards/managing/rtc.jsp">https://www.nsf.gov/awards/managing/rtc.jsp</a>. In accordance with the Research Terms and Conditions Overlay to the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance), 2 CFR §200, recipients of EPA ORD research must abide by the research T&Cs.

# 32. Electronic and Information Technology Accessibility

Recipients are subject to the program accessibility provisions of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, codified in 40 CFR Part 7, which includes an obligation to provide individuals with disabilities reasonable accommodations and an equal and effective opportunity to benefit from or participate in a program, including those offered through electronic and information technology ("EIT"). In compliance with Section 504, EIT systems or products funded by this award must be designed to meet the diverse needs of users (e.g., U.S. public, recipient personnel) without barriers or diminished function or quality. Systems shall include usability features or functions that accommodate the needs of persons with disabilities, including those who use assistive technology. At this time, the EPA will consider a recipient's websites, interactive tools, and other EIT as being in compliance with Section 504 if such technologies meet standards established under Section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act, codified at 36 CFR Part 1194. While Section 508 does not apply directly to grant recipients, we encourage recipients to follow either the 508 guidelines or other comparable guidelines that concern accessibility to EIT for individuals with disabilities.

# 33. Human Subjects

Human subjects research is any activity that meets the regulatory definitions of both research AND human subject. Research is a systematic investigation, including research development, testing and evaluation, designed to develop or contribute to generalizable knowledge. Human subject means a living individual about whom an investigator (whether professional or student) conducting research: (i) Obtains information or biospecimens through intervention or interaction with the individual, and uses, studies, or analyzes the information or biospecimens; or (ii) Obtains, uses, studies, analyzes, or generates identifiable private information or identifiable biospecimens 40 CFR 26.102(e)(l).

No research involving human subjects shall be conducted under this agreement without prior written approval of the EPA Human Subject Research Review Official (HSRRO) to proceed with that research. If engaged in human subjects' research as part of this agreement, the recipient agrees to comply with all applicable provisions of EPA Regulation 40 CFR 26 (Protection of Human Subjects). This includes, at Subpart A, the Basic Federal Policy for the Protection of Human Research Subjects, also known as the Common Rule. It also includes, at Subparts B, C, and D, prohibitions and additional protections for children, nursing women, pregnant women, and fetuses in research conducted or supported by EPA.

The recipient further agrees to comply with EPA's procedures for oversight of the recipient's compliance with 40 CFR 26, as given in EPA Order 1000.17A (Policy and Procedures on Protection of Human Research Subjects in EPA Conducted or Supported Research). As per this order, no human subject may be involved in any research conducted under this assistance agreement, including recruitment, until the research has been approved or determined to be exempt by the EPA HSRRO after review of the approval or exemption determination of the Institutional Review Board(s) (IRB(s)) with jurisdiction over the research under 40 CFR 26.

For HSRRO approval, the recipient must forward to the Project Officer: (1) copies of all documents upon which the IRB(s) with jurisdiction based their approval(s) or exemption determination(s), (2) copies of the IRB approval or exemption determination letter(s), (3) copy of the IRB-approved consent forms and subject recruitment materials, if applicable, and (4) copies of all supplementary IRB correspondence.

Following the initial approvals indicated above, the recipient must, as part of the annual report(s), provide evidence of continuing review and approval of the research by the IRB(s) with jurisdiction, as required by 40 CFR 26.109(e). Materials submitted to the IRB(s) for their continuing review and approval are to be provided to the EPA HSRRO via the Project Officer upon IRB approval. During the course of the research, investigators must promptly report any unanticipated problems involving risk to subjects or others according to requirements set forth by the IRB. In addition, any event that is significant enough to result in the removal of the subject from the study should also be reported to the EPA HSRRO via the Project Officer, even if the event is not reportable to the IRB of record.

# 34. Animal Subjects

The recipient agrees to comply with the Animal Welfare Act of 1966 (P.L. 89-544), as amended, 7 USC 2131- 2156. Recipient also agrees to abide by the "U.S. Government Principles for the Utilization and Care of Vertebrate Animals used in Testing, Research, and Training." (Federal Register 50(97): 20864-20865. May 20,1985). The nine principles can be viewed at <a href="https://olaw.nih.gov/policies-laws/phs-policy.htm">https://olaw.nih.gov/policies-laws/phs-policy.htm</a>. For additional information about the Principles, the recipient should consult the *Guide for the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals*, prepared by the Institute of Laboratory Animal Resources, National Research Council.

# 35. Light Refreshments and/or Meals

# (a) APPLICABLE TO ALL AGREEMENTS EXCEPT STATE CONTINUING ENVIRONMENTAL PROGRAMS (AS DESCRIBED BELOW):

Unless the event(s) and all of its components are described in the approved workplan, the recipient agrees to obtain prior approval from EPA for the use of grant funds for light refreshments and/or meals served at meetings, conferences, training workshops and outreach activities (events). The recipient must send requests for approval to the EPA Project Officer and include:

- (1) An estimated budget and description for the light refreshments, meals, and/or beverages to be served at the event(s)
- (2) A description of the purpose, agenda, location, length, and timing for the event, and
- (3) An estimated number of participants in the event and a description of their roles

Costs for light refreshments and meals for recipient staff meetings and similar day-to-day activities are not allowable under EPA assistance agreements.

Recipients may address questions about whether costs for light refreshments, and meals for events may be allowable to the recipient's EPA Project Officer; however, the Agency Award Official or Grant Management Officer will make final determinations on allowability. Agency policy prohibits the use of EPA funds for receptions, banquets and similar activities that take place after normal business hours unless the recipient has provided a justification that has been expressly approved by EPA's Award Official or Grants Management Officer.

EPA funding for meals, light refreshments, and space rental may not be used for any discrete portion of an event or meeting, such as a reception, banquet, or another similar entertainment-oriented activity, where alcohol is served, purchased, or otherwise available as part of the discrete portion of the event or meeting, even if EPA funds are not used to purchase the alcohol. This restriction does not prohibit a recipient from using its own funds, private donations, or separate fees charged to the meeting attendees (that are not program income) for discrete portions of events or meetings, such as receptions, banquets, or another similar entertainment-oriented activity where alcohol is served.

Note: U.S. General Services Administration regulations define light refreshments for morning, afternoon, or evening breaks to include, but not be limited to, coffee, tea, milk, juice, soft drinks, donuts, bagels, fruit, pretzels, cookies, chips, or muffins. (41 CFR 301-74.7)

# (b) FOR STATE CONTINUING ENVIROMENTAL PROGRAM GRANT RECIPIENTS EXCLUDING STATE UNIVERSITIES:

If the state maintains systems capable of complying with federal grant regulations at <u>2 CFR 200.432</u> and <u>2 CFR 200.438</u>, EPA has waived the prior approval requirements for the use of EPA funds for light refreshments and/or meals served at meetings, conferences, and training, as described in paragraph (a) above. The state may follow its own procedures without requesting prior approval from EPA. However, notwithstanding state policies, EPA funds may not be used for (1) Meetings

(e.g. routine staff meetings) that do not meet the definition of "Conference" in <u>2 CFR 200.432</u>, (2) evening receptions, or (2) other evening events (with the exception of working meetings). Examples of working meetings include those evening events in which small groups discuss technical subjects on the basis of a structured agenda or there are presentations being conducted by experts. EPA funds for meals, light refreshments, and space rental may not be used for any portion of an event (including evening working meetings) where alcohol is served, purchased, or otherwise available as part of the event or meeting, even if EPA funds are not used to purchase the alcohol.

By accepting this award, the state is certifying that it has systems in place (including internal controls) to comply with the requirements described above.

# 36. Tangible Personal Property

#### 36.1 Reporting

Pursuant to <u>2 CFR 200.312</u> and <u>2 CFR 200.314</u>, property reports, if applicable, are required for Federally-owned property in the custody of a recipient or subrecipient upon completion of the Federal award or when the property is no longer needed. Additionally, upon termination or completion of the project, residual unused supplies with a total aggregate fair market value exceeding \$10,000 not needed for any other Federally-funded programs or projects must be reported. For Superfund awards under Subpart O, refer to <u>40 CFR 35.6340</u> and <u>40 CFR 35.6660</u> for property reporting requirements. Recipients should utilize the Tangible Personal Property Report form series (SF-428) to report tangible personal property.

# 36.2 Disposition

- **36.2.1. Most Recipients or Subrecipients.** Consistent with <u>2 CFR 200.313</u>, unless instructed otherwise on the official award document, this award term, or at closeout, the recipient or subrecipient, including a subrecipient of a State or an Indian Tribe, may keep the equipment and continue to use it on the project originally funded through this assistance agreement or on other federally funded projects whether or not the project or program continues to be supported by Federal funds.
- **36.2.2. State Agencies.** Per <u>2 CFR 200.313(b)</u>, recipients that are State agencies must manage and dispose of equipment acquired under this assistance agreement in accordance with state laws and procedures.
- **36.2.3. Indian Tribes.** Per <u>2 CFR 200.313(b)</u>, recipients that are Indian Tribes must manage and dispose of equipment acquired under this assistance agreement in accordance with tribal laws and procedures. If such laws and procedures do not exist, Indian Tribes, unless instructed otherwise on the official award document or at closeout, may keep the equipment and continue to use it on the project originally funded through this assistance agreement or on other federally funded projects whether or not the project or program continues to be supported by Federal funds.
- **36.2.4.** Superfund Recipients. Equipment purchased for Superfund projects under Subpart O is subject to specific disposal options in accordance with <u>40 CFR Part 35.6345</u>.

#### 37. Dual Use Research of Concern (DURC)

The recipient agrees to conduct all life science research\* in compliance with EPA's Order on the Policy and Procedures for Managing Dual Use Research of Concern (EPA DURC Order) and United States Government Policy for Institutional Oversight of Life Sciences Dual Use Research of Concern (iDURC Policy). If the recipient is an institution within the United States that receives funding through this agreement, or from any other source, the recipient agrees to comply with the iDURC Policy if they conduct or sponsor research involving any of the agents or toxins identified in Section 6.2.1 of the iDURC Policy. If the institution is outside the United States and receives funding through this agreement to conduct or sponsor research involving any of those same agents or toxins, the recipient agrees to comply with the iDURC Policy. The recipient agrees to provide any additional information that may be requested by EPA regarding DURC and iDURC. The recipient agrees to immediately notify the EPA Project Officer should the project use or introduce use of any of the agents or toxins identified in the iDURC Policy. The recipient's Institution/Organization must also comply with USG iDURC policy and EPA DURC Order and will inform the appropriate government agency if funded by such agency of research with the agents or toxins identified in Section 6.2.1 of the iDURC Policy. If privately funded the recipient agrees to notify the National Institutes of Health at DURC@od.nih.gov.

\* "Life Sciences Research," for purposes of the EPA DURC Order, and based on the definition of research in 40 CFR §26.102(d), is a systematic investigation designed to develop or contribute to generalizable knowledge involving living organisms (e.g., microbes, human beings, animals, and plants) and their products. EPA does not consider the following activities to be research: routine product testing, quality control, mapping, collection of general-purpose statistics, routine monitoring and evaluation of an operational program, observational studies, and the training of scientific and technical personnel. [Note: This is consistent with Office of Management and Budget Circular A-11.]

## 38. Research Misconduct

In accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.329</u>, the recipient and subrecipient agree to notify the EPA Project Officer in writing about research misconduct involving research activities that are supported in whole or in part with EPA funds under this project. EPA defines research misconduct as fabrication, falsification, or plagiarism in proposing, performing, or reviewing research, or in reporting research results [65 FR 76262. I], or ordering, advising or suggesting that subordinates engage in research misconduct. The recipient agrees to:

- (1) Immediately notify the EPA Project Officer who will then inform the EPA Office of Inspector General (OIG) if, at any time, an allegation of research misconduct falls into one of the categories listed below:
  - A. Public health of safety is at risk
  - B. Agency resources or interests are threatened
  - C. Circumstances where research activities should be suspended
  - D. There is a reasonable indication of possible violations of civil or criminal law

- E. Federal action is required to protect the interests of those involved in the investigation
- F. The research entity believes that the inquiry or investigation may be made public prematurely so that appropriate steps can be taken to safeguard evidence and protect the rights of those involved
- G. Circumstances where the research community or public should be informed. [65 FR 76263.III]
- (2) Report other allegations to the OIG when they have conducted an inquiry and determined that there is sufficient evidence to proceed with an investigation. [65 FR 76263. III]

# 39. Scientific Integrity Terms and Conditions

The recipient agrees to comply with <u>EPA's Scientific Integrity Policy</u> when conducting, supervising, and communicating science and when using or applying the results of science. For purposes of this award condition scientific activities include, but are not limited to, computer modelling, economic analysis, field sampling, laboratory experimentation, demonstrating new technology, statistical analysis, and writing a review article on a scientific issue. The recipient agrees to:

#### 39.1 Scientific Products

- **39.1.1.** Produce scientific products of the highest quality, rigor, and objectivity, by adhering to applicable EPA <u>information quality guidelines</u>, <u>quality policy</u>, and peer review policy.
- **39.1.2.** Prohibit all recipient employees, contractors, and program participants, including scientists, managers, and other recipient leadership, from suppressing, altering, or otherwise impeding the timely release of scientific findings or conclusions.
- **39.1.3.** Adhere to <u>EPA's Peer Review Handbook</u>, 4<sup>th</sup> <u>Edition</u>, for the peer review of scientific and technical work products generated through EPA grants or cooperative agreements which, by definition, are not primarily for EPA's direct use or benefit.

#### 39.2 Scientific Findings

- **39.2.1.** Require that reviews regarding the content of a scientific product that are conducted by the project manager and other recipient managers and the broader management chain be based only on scientific quality considerations, e.g., the methods used are clear and appropriate, the presentation of results and conclusions is impartial.
- **39.2.2.** Ensure scientific findings are generated and disseminated in a timely and transparent manner, including scientific research performed by employees, contractors, and program participants, who assist with developing or applying the results of scientific activities.
- **39.2.3.** Include, when communicating scientific findings, an explication of underlying assumptions, accurate contextualization of uncertainties, and a description of the probabilities associated with both optimistic and pessimistic projections, if applicable.
- 39.2.4. Document the use of independent validation of scientific methods.
- **39.2.5.** Document any independent review of the recipient's scientific facilities and testing activities, as occurs with accreditation by a nationally or internationally recognized sanctioning body.
- **39.2.6.** Make scientific information available online in open formats in a timely manner, including access to data and non-proprietary models.

#### 39.3 Scientific Misconduct

- **39.3.1.** Prohibit intimidation or coercion of scientists to alter scientific data, findings, or professional opinions or non-scientific influence of scientific advisory boards. In addition, recipient employees, contractors, and program participants, including scientists, managers, and other leadership, shall not knowingly misrepresent, exaggerate, or downplay areas of scientific uncertainty.
- **39.3.2.** Prohibit retaliation or other punitive actions toward recipient employees who uncover or report allegations of scientific and research misconduct, or who express a differing scientific opinion. Employees who have allegedly engaged in scientific or research misconduct shall be afforded the due process protections provided by law, regulation, and applicable collective bargaining agreements, prior to any action. Recipients shall ensure that all employees and contractors of the recipient shall be familiar with these protections and avoid the appearance of retaliatory actions.
- **39.3.3.** Require all recipient employees, contractors, and program participants to act honestly and refrain from acts of research misconduct, including publication or reporting, as described in <u>EPA's Policy and Procedures for Addressing Research Misconduct</u>, Section 9.C. Research misconduct does not include honest error or differences of opinion. While EPA retains the ultimate oversight authority for EPA-supported research, grant recipients conducting research bear primary responsibility for prevention and detection of research misconduct and for the inquiry, investigation, and adjudication of research misconduct alleged to have occurred in association with their own institution.
- **39.3.4.** Take the actions required on the part of the recipient described in the EPA's Policy and Procedures for Addressing Research Misconduct, Sections 6 through 9, when research misconduct is suspected or found.

# 40. Post-Award Disclosure of Current and Pending Support on Research Grants

The recipient is required to notify EPA if there has been a change in support for senior/key persons since submission of its application or the last reporting period in the performance report. If there has been a change, the recipient must report the change within 30 calendar days to the EPA Project Officer. The information should also be included in the next due performance report. If there has been a change, submit a revised current and pending support form (see 'EPA Current and Pending Support'). Senior/key persons must certify that the information contained in the updated current and pending support form is current, accurate, and complete. For additional details on what information needs to be disclosed, please see NSTC Pre-award and Post-award disclosures Relating to the Biographical Sketch and Current and Pending (Other) Support at <a href="NSTC Research Security Subcommittee NSPM-33 Implementation Guidance Disclosure Requirements & Standardization">NSTC Research Security Subcommittee NSPM-33 Implementation Guidance Disclosure Requirements & Standardization</a>.

EPA may consult with the Lead/Contact PI and the Authorized Organization Representative (AOR), if necessary, to determine the impact of the new information on the EPA-funded research grant and, where necessary, take appropriate action.

If the recipient discovers that a senior/key person on an active EPA grant failed to disclose current and pending support information or provided inaccurate information as part of the proposal submission process, it must submit a revised current and pending support form (see 'EPA Current and Pending Support') to the EPA Project Officer within 30 calendar days of the identification of the undisclosed or inaccurate current and pending information.

# 41. Procurement of Synthetic Nucleic Acids and Benchtop Nucleic Acid Synthesis Equipment (Effective 4/26/2025)

Beginning on April 26, 2025, the recipient must procure synthetic nucleic acids and benchtop nucleic acid synthesis equipment, as defined in the 2024 Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) Framework for Nucleic Acid Synthesis Screening (Framework), from providers or manufacturers that attest to adhering to the Framework. The attestation may be posted on a public website or provided directly to the recipient upon request. The recipient must include this requirement in all lower tier agreements (for example subrecipients or subcontractors).

# **Public Policy Requirements**

# 42. Civil Rights Obligations (Updated 4/03/2025)

This term and condition incorporates by reference the signed assurance provided by the recipient's authorized representative on: 1) EPA Form 4700-4, "Preaward Compliance Review Report for All Applicants and Recipients Requesting EPA Financial Assistance"; and 2) Certifications and Representations in SAM.gov or Standard Form 424D, as applicable.

These assurances and this term and condition obligate the recipient to comply fully with applicable civil rights statutes and implementing federal and EPA regulations.

#### (a) Statutory Requirements

- i. In carrying out this agreement, the recipient must comply with:
  - 1) Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits discrimination based on race, color, and national origin, by entities receiving Federal financial assistance.
  - Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which prohibits discrimination against persons with disabilities by entities receiving Federal financial assistance; and
  - 3) The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, which prohibits age discrimination by entities receiving Federal financial assistance.
- ii. If the recipient is an education program or activity (e.g., school, college, or university) or if the recipient is conducting an education program or activity under this agreement, it must also comply with:

- 1) Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in education programs and activities operated by entities receiving Federal financial assistance. - iii. If this agreement is funded with financial assistance under the Clean Water Act (CWA), the recipient must also comply with:

# (b) Regulatory Requirements

- 5) As noted on the EPA Form 4700-4 signed by the recipient's authorized representative, these regulations establish specific requirements as applicable, including, but not limited to collecting, maintaining, and providing upon request compliance information, establishing grievance procedures, designating a Civil Rights Coordinator, and providing notices of non-discrimination.

# (c) Title VI – Limited English Proficiency (LEP), Public Participation and Affirmative Compliance Obligation

# 43. Drug-Free Workplace

The recipient organization of this EPA assistance agreement must make an ongoing, good faith effort to maintain a drug-free workplace pursuant to the specific requirements set forth in Title 2 CFR Part 1536 Subpart B. Additionally, in accordance with these regulations, the recipient organization must identify all known workplaces under its federal awards and keep this information on file during the performance of the award.

Those recipients who are individuals must comply with the drug-free provisions set forth in Title  $\underline{2}$  CFR Part 1536 Subpart C.

#### 44. Hotel-Motel Fire Safety

Pursuant to U.S.C. 2225a, the recipient agrees to ensure that all space for conferences, meetings, conventions, or training seminars funded in whole or in part with federal funds complies with the protection and control guidelines of the Hotel and Motel Fire Safety Act (PL 101-391, as amended). Recipients may search the Hotel-Motel National Master List at <a href="https://apps.usfa.fema.gov/hotel/">https://apps.usfa.fema.gov/hotel/</a> to see if a property is in compliance, or to find other information about the Act.

#### 45. Lobbying Restrictions

- a) This assistance agreement is subject to lobbying restrictions as described below. Applicable to all assistance agreements:
  - i. The chief executive officer of this recipient agency shall ensure that no grant funds awarded under this assistance agreement are used to engage in lobbying of the Federal Government or in litigation against the U.S. unless authorized under existing law. The recipient shall abide by the Cost Principles available at <u>2 CFR Part 200</u> which generally

- prohibits the use of federal grant funds for litigation against the U.S. or for lobbying or other political activities.
- ii. The recipient agrees to comply with Title 40 CFR Part 34, New Restrictions on Lobbying. The recipient shall include the language of this provision in award documents for all subawards exceeding \$100,000 and require that subrecipients submit certification and disclosure forms accordingly.
- iii. In accordance with the Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment, any recipient who makes a prohibited expenditure under Title 40 CFR Part 34 or fails to file the required certification or lobbying forms shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such expenditure.
- iv. Contracts awarded by a recipient shall contain, when applicable, the anti-lobbying provision as stipulated in the contract provisions provided in <u>Appendix II to Part 200</u>.
- v. By accepting this award, the recipient affirms that it is not a nonprofit organization described in Section 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 as required by Section 18 of the Lobbying Disclosure Act; or that it is a nonprofit organization described in Section 501(c)(4) of the Code but does not and will not engage in lobbying activities as defined in Section 3 of the Lobbying Disclosure Act. Nonprofit organizations exempt from taxation under section 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code that engage in lobbying activities are ineligible for EPA subawards.
- b) Applicable to assistance agreements when the amount of the award is over \$100,000:
  - i. By accepting this award, the recipient certifies, to the best of its knowledge and belief that:
    - 1) No Federal appropriated funds have been or will be paid, by or on behalf of the recipient, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
    - 2) If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, or any employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal grant or cooperative agreement, the recipient shall complete and submit the linked <u>Standard Form -- LLL</u>, <u>"Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying</u>," in accordance with its instructions.
    - 3) The recipient shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards exceeding \$100,000 at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

ii. This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each failure.

# 46. Recycled Paper

When directed to provide paper documents, the recipient agrees to use recycled paper and doublesided printing for all reports which are prepared as a part of this agreement and delivered to EPA. This requirement does not apply to reports prepared on forms supplied by EPA.

# 47. Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (Updated 4/03/2025)

Consistent with goals of section 6002 of RCRA (42 U.S.C. 6962), State and local institutions of higher education, hospitals and non-profit organization recipients agree to give preference in procurement programs to the purchase of specific products containing recycled materials, as identified in 40 CFR Part 247.

a) Consistent with section 6002 of RCRA (42 U.S.C. 6962) and <u>2 CFR 200.323</u>, the recipient or subrecipient that is a State agency or agency of a political subdivision of a State and its contractors are required to purchase certain items made from recycled materials, as identified in 40 CFR Part 247, when the purchase price exceeds \$10,000 during the course of a fiscal year or where the quantity of such items acquired in the course of the preceding fiscal year was \$10,000 or more. Pursuant to <u>40 CFR 247.2(d)</u>, the recipient or subrecipient may decide not to procure such items if they are not reasonably available in a reasonable period of time; fail to meet reasonable performance standards; or are only available at an unreasonable price.

#### 48. Trafficking in Persons

- a) Provisions applicable to a recipient that is a private entity receiving funds under the award.
  - i. The recipient, the recipient's employees, subrecipients under this award, and subrecipients' employees may not engage in:
    - Severe forms of trafficking in persons
    - The procurement of a commercial sex act during the period of time that this award or any subaward is in effect;
    - 3) The use forced labor in the performance of this award or any subaward; or
    - 4) Acts that directly support or advance trafficking in persons, including the following acts:
      - Destroying, concealing, removing, confiscating, or otherwise denying an employee access to that employee's identity or immigration documents;
      - ii. Failing to provide return transportation or pay for return transportation costs to an employee from a country outside the United States to the country from

which the employee was recruited upon the end of employment if requested by the employee, unless:

- A. Exempted from the requirement to provide or pay for such return transportation by the Federal department or agency providing or entering into the grant or cooperative agreements; or
- B. The employee is a victim of human trafficking seeking victim services or legal redress in the country of employment or a witness in a human trafficking enforcement action;
- iii. Soliciting a person for the purpose of employment, or offering employment, by means of materially false or fraudulent pretenses, representations, or promises regarding that employment;
- iv. Charging recruited employees a placement or recruitment fee; or
- v. Providing or arranging housing that fails to meet the host country's housing and safety standards.
- ii. EPA may unilaterally terminate this award or take any remedial actions authorized by 22 U.S.C. 7104b(c), without penalty, if any private entity under this award:
  - Is determined to have violated a prohibition in paragraph 47.a.i. of this award term; or
  - 2) Has an employee that is determined by the agency official authorized to terminate the award to have violated a prohibition in paragraph 47.a.i. of this award term through conduct that is either:
    - i. Associated with the performance under this award; or
    - ii. Imputed to the recipient or subrecipient using the standards and due process for imputing the conduct of an individual to an organization that are provided in <u>2 CFR Part 180</u>, "OMB Guidelines to Agencies on Government-wide Debarment and Suspension (Non- procurement)," as implemented by EPA at <u>2 CFR Part 1532</u>.
- b) Provision applicable to a recipient other than a private entity. EPA may unilaterally terminate this award or take any remedial actions authorized by 22 U.S.C. 7104b(c), without penalty, if a subrecipient that is a private entity under this award:
  - Is determined to have violated an applicable prohibition in paragraph 48.a.i. of this award term; or
  - ii. Has an employee that is determined to have violated a prohibition in paragraph 48.a.i. of this award term through conduct that is either:
    - 1) Associated with the performance under this award; or
    - 2) Imputed to the subrecipient using the standards and due process for imputing the conduct of an individual to an organization that are provided in 2 CFR Part 180, "OMB Guidelines to Agencies on Governmentwide Debarment and Suspension (Nonprocurement)," as implemented by EPA at 2 CFR Part 1532.

# c) Provisions applicable to any recipient

- The recipient must inform the EPA and the EPA's Office of Inspector General immediately of any information received from any source alleging a violation of a prohibition in paragraph 48.a.i. of this award term.
- ii. The EPA's right to terminate unilaterally that is described in paragraphs 48.a. and 48.b.:
  - 1) Implements the requirements of 22 U.S.C. Chapter 78, and
  - 2) Is in addition to all other remedies for noncompliance that are available to the EPA under this award.
- iii. The recipient must include the requirements of paragraph 48.a.1. of this award term in any subaward made to a private entity.
- iv. If applicable, the recipient must also comply with the compliance plan and certification requirements in 2 CFR 175.105(b).
- d) Definitions. For purposes of this award term:
  - i. "Employee" means either:
    - An individual employed by you or a subrecipient who is engaged in the performance of the project or program under this award; or
    - 2) Another person engaged in the performance of the project or program under this award and not compensated by the recipient including, but not limited to, a volunteer or individual whose services are contributed by a third party as an inkind contribution toward cost sharing requirements.
  - "Private Entity" means any entity, including for-profit organizations, nonprofit organizations, institutions of higher education, and hospitals. The term does not include foreign public entities, Indian Tribes, local governments, or states as defined in <u>2 CFR</u> 200.1
  - iii. The terms "severe forms of trafficking in persons," "commercial sex act," "sex trafficking," "Abuse or threatened abuse of law or legal process," "coercion," "debt bondage," and involuntary servitude" have the meanings given at section 103 of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000, as amended (22 U.S.C. 7102).
- 49. Build America, Buy America Required Use of American Iron, Steel, Manufactured Products, and Construction Materials (effective October 23, 2023, and forward)

**Buy America Preference.** Recipients of an award of Federal financial assistance from a program for infrastructure are hereby notified that none of the funds provided under this award may be used for an infrastructure project unless:

- (1) All iron and steel used in the project are produced in the United States—this means all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States;
- (2) All manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States— this means the manufactured product was manufactured in the United States; and the cost of the

components of the manufactured product that are mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components of the manufactured product, unless another standard that meets or exceeds this standard has been established under applicable law or regulation for determining the minimum amount of domestic content of the manufactured product; and

(3) All construction materials are manufactured in the United States—this means that all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States. The construction material standards are listed below.

Incorporation into an infrastructure project. The Buy America Preference only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, or affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America Preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project, but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project.

Categorization of articles, materials, and supplies. An article, material, or supply should only be classified into one of the following categories: (i) Iron or steel products; (ii) Manufactured products; (iii) Construction materials; or (iv) Section 70917(c) materials. An article, material, or supply should not be considered to fall into multiple categories. In some cases, an article, material, or supply may not fall under any of the categories listed in this paragraph. The classification of an article, material, or supply as falling into one of the categories listed in this paragraph must be made based on its status at the time it is brought to the work site for incorporation into an infrastructure project. In general, the work site is the location of the infrastructure project at which the iron, steel, manufactured products, and construction materials will be incorporated.

**Application of the Buy America Preference by category.** An article, material, or supply incorporated into an infrastructure project must meet the Buy America Preference for only the single category in which it is classified.

**Determining the cost of components for manufactured products**. In determining whether the cost of components for manufactured products is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components, use the following instructions:

- (a) For components purchased by the manufacturer, the acquisition cost, including transportation costs to the place of incorporation into the manufactured product (whether or not such costs are paid to a domestic firm), and any applicable duty (whether or not a duty-free entry certificate is issued); or
- (b) For components manufactured by the manufacturer, all costs associated with the manufacture of the component, including transportation costs as described in paragraph (a), plus

allocable overhead costs, but excluding profit. Cost of components does not include any costs associated with the manufacture of the manufactured product.

**Construction material standards.** The Buy America Preference applies to the following construction materials incorporated into infrastructure projects. Each construction material is followed by a standard for the material to be considered "produced in the United States." Except as specifically provided, only a single standard should be applied to a single construction material.

- (1) Non-ferrous metals. All manufacturing processes, from initial smelting or melting through final shaping, coating, and assembly, occurred in the United States.
- (2) Plastic and polymer-based products. All manufacturing processes, from initial combination of constituent plastic or polymer-based inputs, or, where applicable, constituent composite materials, until the item is in its final form, occurred in the United States.
- (3) Glass. All manufacturing processes, from initial batching and melting of raw materials through annealing, cooling, and cutting, occurred in the United States.
- (4) Fiber optic cable (including drop cable). All manufacturing processes, from the initial ribboning (if applicable), through buffering, fiber stranding and jacketing, occurred in the United States. All manufacturing processes also include the standards for glass and optical fiber, but not for non-ferrous metals, plastic and polymer-based products, or any others.
- (5) Optical fiber. All manufacturing processes, from the initial preform fabrication stage through the completion of the draw, occurred in the United States.
- (6) Lumber. All manufacturing processes, from initial debarking through treatment and planing, occurred in the United States.
- (7) Drywall. All manufacturing processes, from initial blending of mined or synthetic gypsum plaster and additives through cutting and drying of sandwiched panels, occurred in the United States.
- (8) Engineered wood. All manufacturing processes from the initial combination of constituent materials until the wood product is in its final form, occurred in the United States.

Waivers. When supported by rationale provided in IIJA §70914, the recipient may submit a waiver request in writing to EPA. Recipients should request guidance on the submission instructions of an EPA waiver request from the EPA Project Officer for this agreement. A list of approved EPA waivers (general applicability and project specific) is available on the EPA Build America, Buy America website.

EPA may waive the application of the Buy America Preference when it has determined that one of the following exceptions applies:

- (1) applying the Buy America Preference would be inconsistent with the public interest;
- (2) the types of iron, steel, manufactured products, or construction materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient and reasonably available quantities or of a satisfactory quality; or
- (3) the inclusion of iron, steel, manufactured products, or construction materials produced in the United States will increase the cost of the overall project by more than 25 percent.

#### 50. Required Certifications and Consequences of Fraud

I am aware that the provision of false, fictitious, or fraudulent information, or the omission of any material fact, may subject me to criminal, civil, or administrative consequences including, but not limited to violations of U.S. Code Title 18, Sections 2, 1001, 1343 and Title 31, Sections 3729-3730 and 3801-3812."

The certifications must be maintained in accordance with the record retention requirements at  $\underline{2}$  CFR 200.334.

#### 51. Reporting Waste, Fraud and Abuse

Consistent with <u>2 CFR 200.113</u>, the recipient and any subrecipients of this award must promptly report in writing whenever there is credible evidence of the commission of a violation of Federal criminal law involving fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, or gratuity violations found in Title 18 of the United States Code or a violation of the civil False Claims Act (31 U.S.C. 3729-3733) to the EPA Project Officer, the pass-through entity (if applicable), and the <u>EPA Office of Inspector General (OIG)</u>. To support awareness of the OIG hotline, recipients and/or subrecipients receiving an EPA award or subaward of \$1,000,000 or more must display EPA OIG Hotline posters in facilities where the work is performed under the grant. EPA OIG Hotline posters may be <u>downloaded or printed</u> or may be obtained by contacting the OIG at 1-888-546-8740. Recipients and subrecipients need not comply with this requirement if they have established a mechanism, such as a hotline, by which employees may report suspected instances of improper conduct and have provided instructions that encourage employees to make such reports.

Recipients and subrecipients are also required to report matters related to recipient integrity and performance in accordance with Appendix XII to 2 CFR Part 200.

#### 52. Whistleblower Protections

This award is subject is to whistleblower protections, including the protections established at 41 U.S.C. 4712 and 2 CFR 200.217 providing that an employee of the recipient or subrecipient may not be discharged, demoted, or otherwise discriminated against as a reprisal for disclosing to a person or body described in paragraph (a)(2) of 41 U.S.C. 4712 information that the employee reasonably believes is evidence of gross mismanagement of a Federal contract or grant, a gross waste of Federal funds, an abuse of authority relating to a Federal contract, grant, or subaward, a substantial and specific danger to public health or safety, or a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a Federal contract (including the competition for or negotiation of a contract), grant. These covered persons or bodies include:

- a. A member of Congress or representative of a committee of Congress.
- b. An Inspector General.
- c. The Government Accountability Office.
- **d.** A Federal employee responsible for contract or grant oversight or management at the relevant agency.
- e. An authorized official of the Department of Justice or other law enforcement agency.
- f. A court of grand jury.
- g. A management official or other employee of the contractor, subcontractor, or grantee who has the responsibility to investigate, discover, or address misconduct.

Consistent with 41 U.S.C. 4712(d), the recipient and subrecipients must inform their employees in writing, in the predominant language of the workforce or organization, of employee whistleblower rights and protections under 41 U.S.C. 4712. Additional information about whistleblower protections, including protections for such employees may be found at the <a href="EPA Office of Inspector General's Whistleblower Protection page">EPA Office of Inspector General's Whistleblower Protection page</a>.

#### 53. Access to Records

In accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.337</u>, EPA, the pass-through entity, the EPA Office of Inspector General (OIG), and the Comptroller General of the United States have the right to access any records of the recipient and subrecipient pertinent to this award, to perform audits, execute site visits, or for any other official use. This right of access also includes timely and reasonable access to the recipient and subrecipient's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion related to such documents or the Federal award in general. This right of access shall continue as long as the records are retained.

# 54. Federal Anti-Discrimination Laws (Added 4/03/2025; Updated 8/25/2025)

This term and condition applies to all new awards and funding amendments (incremental and supplemental) made on or after April 3, 2025.

# Appendix II to Part 200—Contract Provisions for Non-Federal Entity Contracts Under Federal **Awards**

In addition to other provisions required by the Federal agency or non-Federal entity, all contracts made by the non-Federal entity under the Federal award must contain provisions covering the following, as applicable.

- (A) Contracts for more than the simplified acquisition threshold, which is the inflation adjusted amount determined by the Civilian Agency Acquisition Council and the Defense Acquisition Regulations Council (Councils) as authorized by 41 U.S.C. 1908, must address administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where contractors violate or breach contract terms, and provide for such sanctions and penalties as appropriate.
- (B) All contracts in excess of \$10,000 must address termination for cause and for convenience by the non-Federal entity including the manner by which it will be effected and the basis for settlement.
- (C) Equal Employment Opportunity. Except as otherwise provided under 41 CFR Part 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 CFR Part 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 CFR 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 CFR Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor."
- (D) Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C. 3141-3148). When required by Federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States"). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be

- prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.
- (E) Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Under 40 U.S.C. 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.
- (F) Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement. If the Federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 CFR § 401.2 (a) and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency.
- (G) Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q.) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387), as amended—Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the non-Federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
- (H) Debarment and Suspension (Executive Orders 12549 and 12689)—A contract award (see 2 CFR 180.220) must not be made to parties listed on the governmentwide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with the OMB guidelines at 2 CFR 180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 CFR part 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 CFR part 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549.
- (I) Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. 1352)—Contractors that apply or bid for an award exceeding \$100,000 must file the required certification. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. 1352. Each tier must also disclose any lobbying with non-Federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any Federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-Federal award.
